Recycling center coming to Summers County

My mom was the original recycler and continued to "reduce, reuse, and recycle" until her passing in 2019. Mom knew I spent a career removing barriers to enable success in business and advancement opportunities for others, so I promised her I would do that to find out why Summers County didn't have a recycling program. A year ago, I posted an inquiry on the Summers County Facebook page asking if anyone was interested in a recycling program here. The responses were overwhelming, which motivated me to find out more. The commissioners welcomed me to the board of the Solid Waste Authority. In the months that followed, no one seemed to know what the expectations were or how to move forward with a program. After

only one meeting, it became obvious that no one knew what was expected or how to conduct a meeting.

The West Virginia SWA was thrilled to hear that someone was interested in creating a sustainable recycling program for Summers County! The next steps were to pull together a legal, working board with a mission. Next, regular meetings were scheduled to begin the process of re-establishing relationships with our state office as guidance for moving forward. With their assistance, documentation and protocols for conducting business with public invitations were set. The elimination of the dysfunctional director role placed more responsibility on the board, but the team rose to the challenge. In October of last year, I was elected Chairperson of the Summers County

Solid Waste Authority, with Mike Gore, Commissioner and Vice-Chair, Larry Beverley, Treasurer, Dennis Bailey, DEP designee, and Chad Meador, board member. It is this board that has provided the framework to bring recycling to Summers County.

Understanding where the funding comes from for the recycling program is key to a successful program. While monthly "tipping fees," the fees paid by the landfills to the state and distributed to the 55 counties for recycling, provide an income of approximately \$2000 a month, it does not cover all the needs of a sustainable program. The SCSWA must rely on grants to fund big items such as a building, equipment and manpower to operate. To be grant eligible, audits were allowed to lag for over six years. Again,

with the guidance of our helpful state office, all paperwork, proposals, and vetting have now been submitted for a June 30 goal of completion. Then another barrier: the 20-year plan had not been reviewed and updated as required every five years. This too is a requirement for grant eligibility. Once again, our state office has been instrumental in guiding this to completion. In addition, the great folks at the Greenbrier Recycling Center, especially Todd Riggs, provided insight and guidance for the physical setup and brochure information for public education on the proper preparation of recyclables.

It is with GREAT pleasure that the SCSWA announces the lease-to-purchase agreement for the property located at 2128 Greenbrier Drive to serve as the collection site for all recyclables in

Summers County to feed the Ronceverte recycling Center! Over the next two years, we must raise \$160,000 through grants and donations for this permanent location for Summers County residents.

Please stay tuned for the GRAND OPENING coming soon! Start collecting flattened, clean cardboard, clean metals and tins, Newspapers, magazines, and plastic bottles #1 and #2. Items must be sorted. Knowing how to properly prepare recyclable items will eliminate wasting the whole load. This program will only be successful if done correctly, which also places responsibility on you, the Summers County residents, to avoid leaving trash, which is called "illegal dumping." Hobby by Heart is giving Chainsaw Carving Demonstrations at 9 a.m., noon and 1:30 p.m. Mike Stouter's Touring Musical Theater is presenting All Aboard the Iron Horse at 10 a.m. and 2:15 p.m. beside the post office. Another performance will take place at 6 p.m. at the tunnel. The Wynes Facility for Families and Children is holding a pie baking contest and a children's pie-eating contest. The deadline to enter the baking contest is June 25.

The day ends with a live musical performance by The Tams at 7 p.m. at the tunnel.

On Sunday morning, a church service will be held at the tunnel by Reverend Nathan Smith from River Valley Baptist Church. A car show will follow between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. food and craft vendors will also be available. Finally, at 1:30 p.m., the John Henry Days "Pluck a Duck" event will take place.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Non-Detects (ND): lab analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as storm water run-off, agriculture, and residential users.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or the result of mining activity.

Organic contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and also come from gas stations, urban storm water run-off, and septic systems.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulation which limits the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. We treat our water according to EPA's regulations. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Our water system has an estimated population of 1338 and is required to test a minimum of 2 samples per month in accordance with the Total Coliform Rule for microbiological contaminants. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are done to determine if harmful bacteria are present in the water supply. If this limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public.

Water Quality Data

The following tables list all of the drinking water contaminants which were detected during the 2021 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate the water poses a health risk. Unless noted, the data presented in this table is from the testing done January 1- December 31, 2021. NOTICE is hereby given that Appalachian Power Company and Wheeling Power Company (the Companies), public utilities, have, on March 15, 2022, filed with the Public Service Commission of West Virginia a Petition to update the Modified Rate Base Cost (MRBC) surcharge revenues. The Public Service Commission's June 30, 2021, Order in Case No. 20-1012-E-P required the Companies to file an annual MBRC update after March 14 but no later than March 21 of 2022, 2023, and 2024. If approved, the increased rates will apply to electric service to approximately 467,295 customers in the counties of Boone, Brooke, Cabell, Clay, Fayette, Greenbrier, Jackson, Kanawha, Lincoln, Logan, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Monroe, Nicholas, Ohio, Putnam, Raleigh, Roane, Summers, Wayne, and Wyoming.

The Companies propose to recover total incremental revenue requirements for certain rate base increases added between October 1, 2020, and September 30, 2021. The proposed increased rates and charges will produce approximately \$12.3 million annually in additional revenue, an increase of 0.77%. The average monthly bill for the various class of customers will be changed as follows:

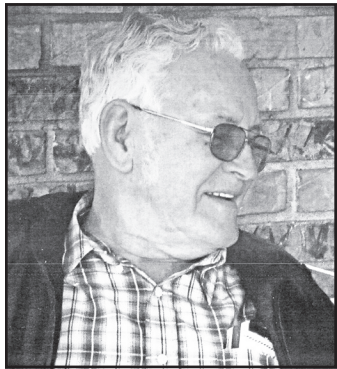
