Culvert collapse discovered during sidewalk replacement

Recently, the City of Hinton has been working to replace several sidewalks in the downtown area. While most of the project has been completed, one section remains incomplete. The city recently issued an update regarding this section.

According to the City of Hinton's statement, crews discovered a culvert collapse while replacing the section of sidewalk near the Avis Overhead Bridge. The announcement further states that the West Virginia Department of Highways is in the process of rectifying the situation. Sidewalk replacement will resume once DOH has completed the necessary upgrades.

In a recent statement, the City of Hinton noted that they are working closely with the State Department of Highways office regarding the 17th Ave. culvert collapse. According to the statement, DOH is performing core drillings to test the soil strength and composition in the area.

Additionally, the City is reportedly working towards removing the building from the area to aid DOH in making the necessary repairs.

The City asks for residents' patience as work continues, noting that the project has the potential to be a long process as the team determines the best solutions. The statement goes on to say that DOH has already lined the old culvert to the best of its abilities and stabilized the road.

Hinton native Art Callaham publishes new book, On America

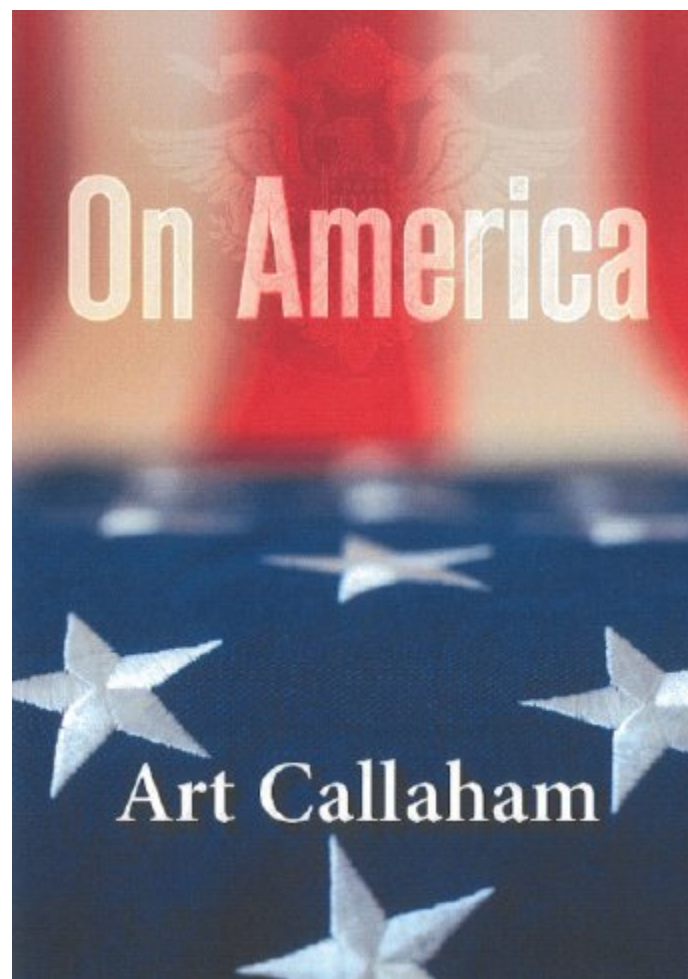

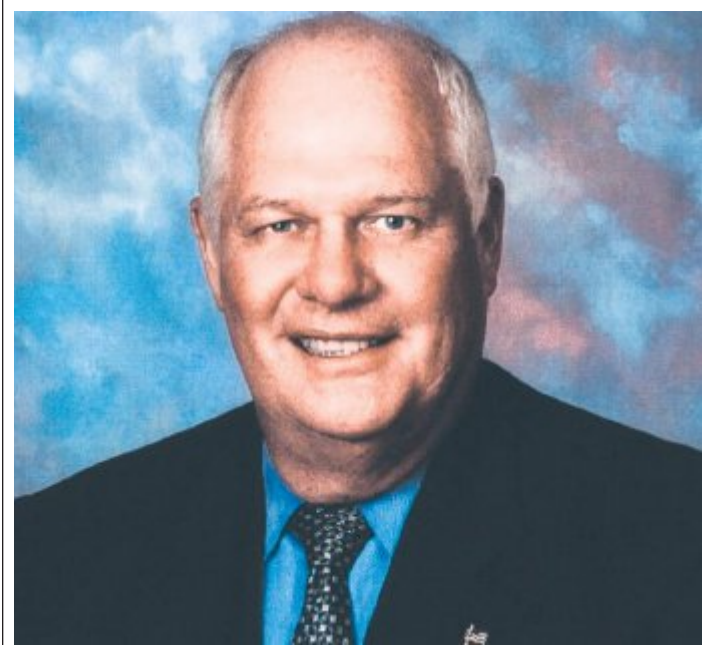

SCEMS saves lives with new equipment

In April of this year, the Summers County Emergency Medical Service (SCEMS) was awarded \$90,000 in ARP funding from the Summers County Commission. With that funding and approximately \$12,000 of their own funding, SCEMS purchased six monitor/defibrillator devices to be part of the equipment for each of their six trucks. These devices provide an advanced diagnosis of heart-related conditions. The units have two batteries and can print waveform capture on-scene.

Since the arrival of those units, SCEMS has been able to save the lives of four Summers County individuals in massive heart attack situations. Paramedic Nick Crewsey said they have proven to be life-saving devices and are "worth every penny."

Commissioner Ted Kula ex-

plained, "We are fortunate to have Summers County EMS working to serve our residents. Other counties struggle with ambulance service, and this funding helps ensure SCEMS can provide top-notch care."

The previous defibrilla-

tors had reached end-of-life status, which means parts are no longer available. The new ones are the latest version of the devices, have many more capabilities, and are more rugged. The new devices should last 10 to 15 years.

One arrested on drug related charges

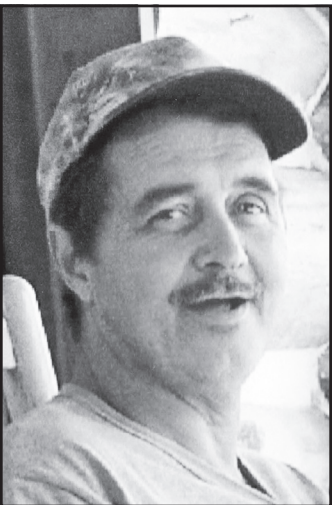
During the early morning hours of Sunday, September 25, police officers responded to a call regarding two individuals who were allegedly passed out in a vehicle. The incident ended with the arrest of one person, Tasha Pack, 39, of Pipestem.

According to the criminal complaint, police arrived and identified both individuals. Pack was the passenger. An investigation took place, which re-

vealed a brown substance believed to be fentanyl in the pocket of a woman's jacket. Additionally, the criminal complaint states that several small plastic bags and a digital scale were in the vehicle. The scale was reportedly in a bag on the passenger side of the vehicle.

Pack was booked in Southern Regional Jail to await arraignment in magistrate court. At the time of writing, she is no longer in SRJ.

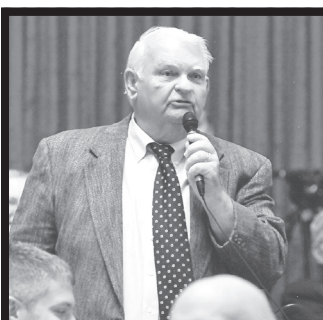

I have tried talking to Amanda about it, but she insists she’s safe and knows what she is doing. My question is, should I tell my sister (her mom) or not? They

don’t really get along, and this will surely make things worse. -- AFRAID FOR HER IN IDAHO

DEAR AFRAID: Amanda is playing with fire. If your daughter were walking on a ledge 20 stories above the sidewalk, thinking “she knows what she’s doing,” wouldn’t you want to be notified? Her father should be tipped off as well if he’s in the picture. Someone needs to get through to that girl, who seems determined to put herself in harm’s way.

DEAR ABBY: I am a 60-year-old female. Over the past 10 years, people have increasingly been calling me “Sir” in public. I hate it. I go to the salon to get my

In the House

Your legislature has now completed two special sessions. As you will recall the first was to deal with a bill to lower state income taxes. That bill passed by a wide majority in the House of Delegates but was allowed to die in the Senate. Also, the governor agreed to place House Bill 302 on the agenda at that time. HB 302 would become known as the abortion bill. Essentially the bill, as passed out of the House of Delegates, would halt all abortions in West Virginia except the case of rape and incest. Within the bill was the requirement that rape and incest must be reported to law enforcement

When HB302 arrived in the senate it was de-

bated and changes were made to the reporting requirement of the bill and the penalty section was changed as well. The bill then came back to the house and we refused to concur. At that point, we were adjourned while a compromise was reached on the changes made by the Senate. A compromise was made and we were called back during September Interims to debate and vote on the final bill. We met, debated the bill and passed it.

During the September Interims, the governor called another special session to deal with transferring monies to the Highways Department and to deal with a bill allowing property to be sold to Berkshire Hathaway in the Ravenswood area. We vot-

ed, as requested, to put another 150 million dollars into the Highways Fund for the purpose of paving secondary roads throughout the state. We have the extra money due to increased coal and natural gas severance tax collections. I anticipate more funding will be moved to highways over the coming months to support continuing upgrades and repairs. The bill allowing land to be sold to Berkshire Hathaway also passed with no opposition. Berkshire Hathaway will, at little to no expense to the taxpayers, develop an industrial complex along the Ohio River near Ravenswood that will employ up to 1000 people when fully operational. That industrial site will be designed to be independent of the electric

grid in West Virginia and will only use fossil fuel-generated electricity when the renewable systems on site cannot keep up with the demand.

Both of these special sessions were conducted within the time already set aside for interim meetings and were no extra expense to the taxpayers.

I continue to need your advice and criticism as you see fit and I can be reached at (304) 646-1209. We are still harvesting hay and will soon start the corn harvest so the best time to contact me would be late evenings or early mornings.

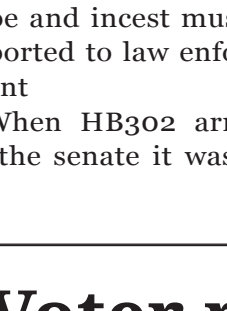
Voter registration deadline announced for Nov. election

Sen. Baldwin leads Family Treatment Court panel at Healing Appalachia

LEWISBURG, W.Va. (Hinton News) - Senate Minority Leader Stephen Baldwin moderated a panel discussion on Fayette County's Family Treatment Court during day two of the Healing Appalachia event, which was held on the grounds of the State Fair of West Virginia.

Healing Appalachia is an annual fundraising event produced by the non-profit Hope in the Hills, LLC. It brings awareness to substance abuse disorders, celebrates recovery, and works to create more projects "fostering communities of recovery." More than 100,000 Americans died as the result of a drug overdose in 2021, and West Virginia continues to suffer the highest rate of overdose death in the nation.

"This epidemic is ravaging our state," said Baldwin. "We must all come together to help end this once and for all."

"I was proud to once again be a part of Healing Appalachia," Baldwin continued. "Too often I hear from those who struggle with substance abuse disorder. Events like Healing Appalachia let people know they are not alone and that their community is supportive of their continued recovery. I was also honored to lead a panel during this event to bring awareness to the Fayette County Treatment Court."



Fayette County Circuit Court Judge Thomas Ewing and Fayette County Family Treatment Coordinator Heather Lucas also served as panelists during the event. Alyssa Berry, a Family Treatment Court graduate who now works as Parent Resource Navigator in Fayette County, also joined the discussion.

"The Family Treatment Courts - and specifically the Family Treatment Court in Fayette County - [are] doing some exciting, effective new things for folks here in West Virginia, and are positively impacting people's lives," Sen. Baldwin told the several thousand in attendance.

Judge Ewing said, "Family Treatment Court is what we call a 'problem solving court,' and the problem that Family Treatment Court is designed to fix is substance abuse."

Ewing explained that a "treatment team" consisting of community volunteers works directly with those enrolled in the Family Treatment Court program to create a foundation of support. The court also works with the community to coordinate recovery resources for enrollees.

"When it's all said and done, they've (program enrollees) built a different life for themselves," Ewing added. "It's a change program. That's what it is - it's all about change."

Program coordinator Heather Lucas then spoke about the recovery process, saying, "The recovery for each [individual] is a little different."

"When our participants - who are there by choice - allow themselves to be transparent, they create their own roadmap and timeframe," Lucas continued. "Everybody's puzzle looks different. When we try a piece that doesn't fit, we try something different."

"We have close relationships with them," Lucas noted. "Every single day we have contact."

Alyssa Berry, the day's final panelist, then spoke about her experience as a Family Treatment Court enrollee.

"I wanted to do it because, rather than a normal CPS (Child Protective Services) case, Family Treatment Court gave me the opportunity to learn and grow with my kids and be able to see them more," Berry said. "[It allowed me to] really work on my recovery in a way that works best for me."

"One of the biggest challenges was trying to just focus on my recovery," Berry added. "Knowing that my children were being taken care of, but just trying to get to the point where I was okay in my recovery, and then learn how to be a parent. Family Treatment Court gave me that opportunity."

Since her graduation from the program, Berry has been working primarily with parents and guardians currently involved in abuse and neglect cases, saying, "I can give them guidance on what I was doing because I've had that experience."

Including Fayette County, 11 circuit courts currently maintain a Family Treatment Court in West Virginia. Ohio County (1st Circuit); Marshall, Tyler, Wetzel counties (2nd Circuit); Wood County (4th Circuit); Roane, Calhoun counties (5th Circuit); Logan County (7th Circuit); McDowell County (8th Circuit); Kanawha County (13th Circuit); Randolph County (20th Circuit); Boone County (25th Circuit); Nicholas County (28th Circuit).

"We need more of them [Family Treatment Courts] across the State of West Virginia," Baldwin noted

at the panel's conclusion. "We're going to work with the Supreme Court, the legislature, county judges, and non-profits - including Healing Appalachia - to see how many more Family Treatment Courts we can get across the state to help people recover and reunite with their families."

"There is hope, we are healing, and recovery is real," Baldwin said.
