Summers County REACHH held its first annual Chili'n on the New chili cook-off on Saturday, Nov. 5. Individuals, businesses and organizations cooked up batches of their unique chili recipes in a contest to see who would garner the most votes from the community. Varieties ranged from extremely spicey to traditional and vegetarian. In addition to the various types of chili to try, multiple vendors set up selling jewelry, clothing, handmade items, art and much more. Participants included members of the City of Hinton Fire Department, the Summers County ACWP, West Virginia State Troopers with the Summers County detachment, chefs, home cooks and many others. Participants and their recipes were sorted into different categories and classes. Entries were first sorted between professional and amateur cooks. The recipe categories included spicy, traditional and creative. An unconfirmed rumor circulated the Freight Depot that one of the spicy chili entries was so hot that a drink in hand was necessary for even the tiniest taste. Attendees paid a \$5 entry fee after arriving at the Hinton Freight Depot. The entry fee included yellow tickets, which acted as votes for a person's favorite chili. Once inside, all the chili vendors had tasting cups at the ready. Those in attendance had the opportunity to taste as many types of chili as they wanted. When someone found a chili they particularly enjoyed, they placed one of the yellow tickets inside a jar sitting on the contestant's table.

The City of Hinton released an update regarding the 17th Ave. culvert collapse on its Facebook page on Monday, Nov. 7. According to the update, City officials have spoken with Department of Highways (DOH) representatives.

Reportedly, DOH noted that officials consulted with a contractor who specializ-

es in "boring and jacking" large pipes. Due to the complicated nature of the project, DOH decided to put the project out for bid. The update states that the chosen contractor will drill a new pipe beside the old structure, which will be filled to stabilize the area.



Michael Dennis McNeer, 79, of Forest Hill, WV, died Wednesday, November 2, 2022, following a long illness. Mike was the son of the late Buford and Anna Mae McNeer.

Born in Hinton, WV, on October 12, 1943, Mike earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia and received his medical degree from West Virginia University in 1969. He retired from psychiatry in 2005. Throughout his long career, he helped many in both West Virginia and Ohio. His patients loved

him. Much of his work was in addiction medicine. Mike was a friend of Bill's, recently celebrating 38 years of continuous sobriety.

Mike spent hours studying the lives of the Christian mystics, frequently quoting Julian of Norwich: "All will be well." He enjoyed listening to music, often asking Alexa to play favorite classical pieces and hymns. He walked daily, until he was too weak to do so, and appreciated the natural beauty near his Summers County home.

He also loved to eat. The only dishes he didn't care for were liver and tomato aspic. It is cruelly ironic that a man who loved to eat as much as Mike did would succumb to esophageal cancer, and that chemotherapy would steal his taste for coffee and peanut butter, two former dietary staples.

Mike is survived by his devoted wife, Debbi; daughter, Elizabeth Deep of Florida; and sons, James of Alaska and Lee of Charlotte, NC; Lee's children, Max, Beck, Cade, and Laine; and by his dear cousins, Dell Gates and Vickie Navarra. His life was enriched by friends, Art

Van Zee, Ann Price, Kent Higgins, and Nancy Martin, as well as many others, near and far.

The family would like to acknowledge and thank the staffs of Carl Larson Cancer Center, Hospice of Southern West Virginia, Bowers Hospice House, and Summers County ARH for the care, attention, and support each provided at various times during Mike's illness.

Special thanks also are extended to Mike's church family. Ascension Episcopal Church in Hinton, WV, was truly a sanctuary for Mike. He was cremated, and his ashes placed in the columbarium there. 


## Award winning poet to read at Concord University



The enforcement action against One Eye details how an individual named Prince Anand closed another voice service provider, PZ Telecommunication LLC, and became the apparent CEO of One Eye. This transition occurred after the Federal Communications Commission sent PZ Telecom a cease-and-desist letter. Avid has refused to answer the CID and One Eye has stopped responding to the task force.

## W.Va. voters reject GOP proposals on school, tax control

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — Voters in West Virginia rejected four proposed amendments to the state constitution Tuesday, including two that would have given the Republican-dominated legislature more power to regulate public education policy and certain taxes.

Other failed amendments would have prohibited the state Supreme Court intervention in the Legislature's impeachment trials and allowed churches to incorporate.

West Virginia Education Association President Dale Lee praised the outcome on the education and tax amendments, saying West Virginia voters "clearly saw through the power grab from the legislature" to "continue their assault on public education and education employees."

"Local control is one of the cornerstones of our county government and local school system," said Lee, head of the state's largest public educators' union. "Rejecting the proposed amendments will allow that local control to continue."

Amendment 4 on Tuesday's ballot would have required the state Board of Education to submit new rules and regulations to the legislature annually for final approval. Currently, it's the only government agency that's exempt.
