SUMMERS COUNTY, (Hinton News) - In 2009, the family of the late Dickie Noel asked the football coaches of the three Summers County Youth League divisions, Summers Middle School and Summers County High School to select individuals for the “Dickie Noel Heart, Hustle and Character Award.” These awards are still continuing. The individuals that receive this honor must be reputable athletes showing leadership, team spirit and good sportsmanship on and off the field, have good moral values, and be outstanding students. These individuals display a strong work ethic, put others before themselves, maintain good grades, and have no school discipline issues. To date, 95 recipients have been selected for this award.

The 2022 Summers County Youth Football League coaches chose Lucas Harrah as the Varsity recipient, Colton Weikle as the Junior Varsity recipient and Paxton Mann as the Pee Wee recipient.

The 2022 Summers Middle School football coaches selected Damien Fullen as the recipient.

The 2022 Summers County High School coaches selected Xander Hudgins, Bryce Taylor, Brandon Isaac and Frankie McClaugherty as the recipients.

The award is given in memory of Dickie Noel, a 1982 graduate of Hinton High School. Dickie played football in Summers County Midget League, Hinton Junior High and Hinton High School. He was captain of his high school team. Dickie displayed Heart, Hustle and Character every practice and every game. He was selected to the Summers County Football Hall of Fame in 1988 and was inducted posthumously. He is the only player from Hinton High School or Summers County High School to have his football jersey number retired - #41. He went on to play football at Concord College with the same Heart, Hustle and Character displayed in high school. He was later sidelined due to a shoulder injury, but he was always there to encourage his teammates.

Dickie also excelled on the baseball field, beginning with the Hinton Little League, where he was selected to the All Stars team and later played in the Senior League Baseball program. He umpired and mentored Hinton Little League baseball in his high school and college years.

He was a 1986 graduate of Concord College with a degree in Travel Industry Management. He was Assistant Manager of Sam Snead’s Tavern at the Homestead Resort in Hot Springs, VA, at the time of his death in September 1988.

Black History in Summers County Exhibit on display at Bluefield State University

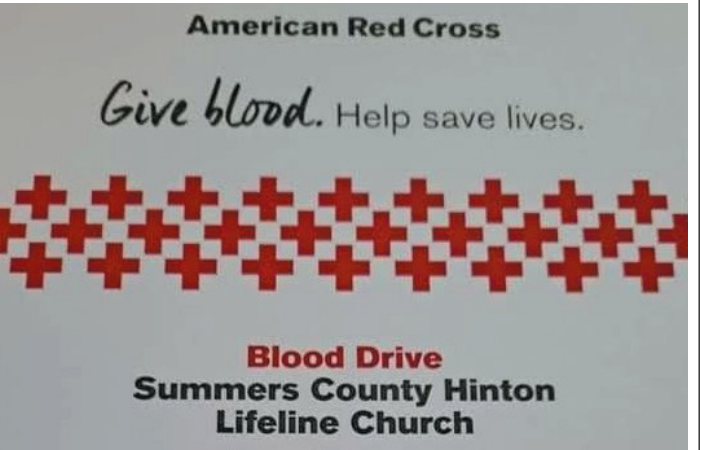

about them.

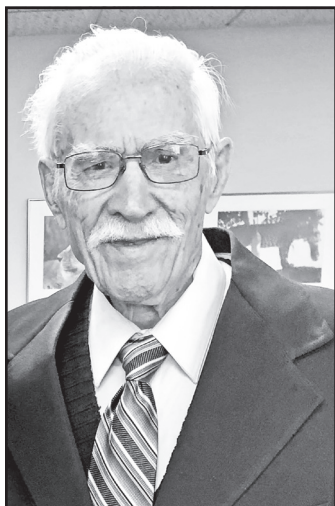

Dennis Ray Fix, Sr.

Dennis Ray Fix, Sr. passed away peacefully to be with the Lord in Salem, VA, during the late evening hours on January 26, 2023, at the age of ninety-five.

Mr. Fix was born to Cora Lee Mills Fix and William Franklin Fix on August 23, 1927, in the community of Cool Ridge in Raleigh County, WV. At age fourteen, Dennis moved with his family to Summers County, WV. He lived for many years on his family's farm in that County. He was a resident of Salem, VA, from 1956 until his death.

Mr. Fix was a World War II and Korean War veteran. He enlisted in the United States Army and served in the European Theater in both France and Germany. He began his military service as a Cook, and he was later promoted to Company Armorer. He then served as a Combat Engineer, while he served in Germany during the later stages of WWII. In that latter capacity, Dennis's Army unit constructed pontoon and other bridges, many times while under enemy fire, for the U. S. Army

during the Allied push towards Berlin.

Dennis also served a short stint in Korea after Germany's surrender on May 7, 1945, before being reassigned by the Army back to Germany. Among other duties, he had patrol duties on the Russian border, after the German surrender. He attained the rank of Sergeant First Class, before leaving military service and returning home to West Virginia, after his honorable discharge when back in the country.

Dennis married Ruby Ann Dennis in 1956. They remained married for fifty-one years, until Ann's death on December 17, 2007, after a lengthy illness. They had two children, Kay Ann Fix and Dennis ("Denny") Ray Fix, Jr.

After returning home from Europe and leaving the Army, Mr. Fix worked for several companies performing a number of skilled jobs in Ohio and Virginia, and he worked for the General Electric Company in Salem, VA, as a machinist and an electrician, where he remained for thirty-four years until his retirement in 1989. The entire time he worked for General Electric, Dennis was a member of General Electric's primary union, the International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE AFL-CIO) Local 161, and he remained a proud lifetime member of that union and a supporter of union rights everywhere.

In his younger years, Dennis enjoyed hunting and observing wild game, farming at the family farm in West Virginia, and doing light gardening, while residing at his home in Salem. He was

a rabid fan and follower of University of Virginia sports, particularly men's basketball, and he was especially fond of Coach Tony Bennett and current players, Kihei Clark and Isaac McKneely (who is from Poca, WV). He consistently prayed for the team, whenever he watched them play, whether on television or in person, and he was immensely thrilled with their run to their National Championship in 2019.

Mr. Fix is survived by many friends, including the Reverend Tommy Price and his wife, Reynosa, Pastor Roy Kanode, Harry F. Bosen, Jr. and his wife, Ellie Bosen, J. C. Poindexter and his wife, Martha, Jackie Rowe, Cordell Jones, Jane Oakes, Barbara Hoskins, Ellen Kneivel (Indiana), Benny Peyton, Jack Lawson, Louie Hicks, and Darryl Dillon. He is also survived by fellow WWII veteran friend, Retired M. D. Robert Kee (Bedford County), Virginia, and many other friends. Three of his other long time closest friends, Dennis Parks, T. J. Hoskins, and Kermit Rowe, recently passed away. Another longtime friend, Harry Peyton, also predeceased Dennis.

Mr. Fix was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, Ruby Ann; his daughter, Kay Ann, who died in early childhood; and by all six of his siblings, to-wit: June Ann Fix (who passed before Dennis was born), William Franklin Fix of West Virginia, Virginia Lee Fix Vaughn of West Virginia, Nellie Christine Lowe of West Virginia, Robert Allen Fix of West Virginia, and William Franklin Fix of Georgia.

Dennis is survived by his son, Dennis Ray Fix, Jr. ("Denny"), of Salem, VA; as well as numerous nieces and nephews, including Linda Lilley of West Virginia, Rodney Fix of West Virginia, Randy Fix of West Virginia, Robbie Fix of West Virginia, Catherine Coleman of Salem, VA, and Larry Dennis of Salem, VA.

The family and friends of Mr. Fix wish to express their gratitude for the staff and the doctors at the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Salem, VA, for all of their medical treatment and services provided over many years to Dennis, in particular Milixa Fortuna, M.D., and Chaplain Catina Martin, who assisted during Dennis's recent stay in Hospice care.

A visitation was held at the

Lotz Funeral Home Chapel, located at 1330 East Main Street in Salem, VA, on Monday, January 30, 2023, from 6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., followed by a brief memorial service conducted by Pastor Roy Kanode of Ridgewood Baptist Church.

A visitation was held on Thursday, the 2nd day of February, 2023, from 10:30 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. at Ronald Meadows Funeral Parlor located at 130 Temple Street, in Hinton, WV; it was followed immediately by a funeral/memorial service at Ronald Meadows and there-

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Problems at Southern Regional Jail

Serious problems at the Southern Regional Jail raise concerns about public safety. On January 17th, seven inmates were transported by ambulance to the hospital with overdoses. On January 24th, three inmates were treated for injuries after weapons and contraband were found at SRJ. Last week, Corrections Commissioner, Brad Douglas, appeared before the House Jails and Prisons Committee. He addressed the crisis in WV jails saying, "We're absolutely working our people to death, and they are quitting because of that." About a third of the positions for corrections officers are unfilled. Officers have to work 16 hour shifts to staff the regional jails.

In the meantime, Governor Justice is making a tour of the state to promote his idea of cutting the state personal income tax for the wealthiest folks in West Virginia. He says that the state has such a big surplus of already collected taxes and grants from the federal government, that West Virginia can afford to cut its revenue and its state services. He says that will make more people want to move here.

However, it's hard to understand why the already collected taxes are sitting in the coffers in Charleston and the governor considers it "surplus" while the state government has not adequately funded public safety.

With the Republican supermajority in the W.Va. State Senate (31 Republicans/3 Democrats) we the People are seeing how extremely unbalanced our supposedly bipartisan W.Va. State Government has become. Hinton man charged with Brandishing a Deadly Weapon

HINTON, (Hinton News) - Local police were called to an alleged altercation involving a firearm between multiple individuals in downtown Hinton on Sunday, Jan. 29. At the conclusion, one individual was charged.

According to the criminal complaint, the dispute was over a stove that the victim and other individuals were moving out of a residence. An officer arrived at the scene and reportedly removed a Taurus .380 from one of the individuals, Edward Lilly, 77, of Hinton. The officer then spoke to the victim, who allegedly stated Lilly had arrived at the residence and exited his vehicle with said firearm. The victim further alleged that a verbal altercation occurred during which Lilly made a threatening comment. According to the criminal complaint, the victim stated Lilly said he would "blow a hole" through them.

Additionally, the officer spoke with the other individuals at the scene. One person reportedly advised the officer that their father had been renting the property before passing away, and they were there to move some of his belongings out. The stove in question was one of the items the family was moving.

The criminal complaint states that both sides claimed to own the stove.

When the officer spoke with Lilly, he reportedly stated that he only pulled the firearm when the victims allegedly sat down the dolly holding the stove and advanced toward him.

After the altercation ended, Lilly was charged with Brandishing a Deadly Weapon. West Virginia code states, "It shall be unlawful for any person armed with a firearm or other deadly weapon, whether licensed to carry the same or not, to carry, brandish or use such weapon in a way or man-

ner to cause, or threaten, a breach of the peace." At the time of writing, Lilly is not incarcerated. Stick with Hinton News for more local crime stories.

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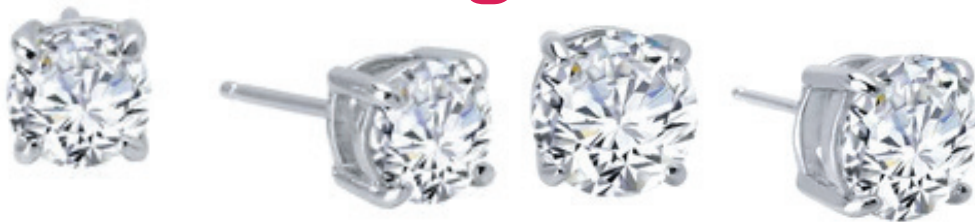


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
