HINTON, (Hinton News) - West Virginia's First Lady, Cathy Justice, was in Hinton on Friday. Justice attended the "Pup Assembly" at Hinton Area Elementary to welcome their therapy Labradoodle, Marshal. Marshal was gifted to HAE through Justice's Communities in Schools, Friends with Paws initiative.

The event consisted of remarks by Justice and some of her office staff, as well as Da-

vid Warvel, superintendent, and Kit Durnan, assistant principal. Principal Angel Gumm had prior obligations.

Justice's staff explained to HAE students that Marshal is working when he is at school, just like they will have a career someday. Justice encouraged good attendance and told students that Marshal would be waiting to see them every day when they came to school.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, each student re-

Justice stated, "We have vetted these dogs for a year and a half. We got the very best emotional support dogs that we could. Since COVID, there have been a lot of children that are uneasy about coming to school. We are seeing a really great improvement in behavior, academics, and attendance. The children want to come to school and want to be a part of the dog. So I know Marshal is going to be a great success here."

## Concord University's program in substance use studies accepting applications for fall 2023

ATHENS, W.Va. (Hinton News) - Concord University will offer a new program of study in the fall of 2023. A program for a Bachelor of Science in Substance Use Studies was approved by the Board of Governors in June of 2022, and since that time, has also been approved by the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission (WVHEPC) and the Higher Learning Commission (HLC).

The program combines courses from Psychology, Social Work, and Sociology. The degree is designed to prepare students to work in support fields for individuals with Substance Use Disorders, as well as related research fields, and to continue in post-baccalaureate education in the field.

This degree is also applicable to students who will go into other fields like health care, research, public policy development, law, and more.

"The CDC estimates that there were over 107,000 drug overdose deaths in 2021,

suggesting an increase of 15% over the estimated overdose deaths in 2020. Over 80,000 of those deaths were attributed to opioids," says Dr. Adriana Falco, associate professor of psychology. "The opioid epidemic has spread across the country with West Virginia feeling significant impacts from the epidemic. This interdisciplinary major will help provide an understanding so that students can find a role to help the country heal from this major health crisis."

The Substance Use Studies major is crucial to begin educating students about the risk factors, brain changes, history, and social impacts of substance use and misuse. It is divided into three primary objectives: pharmacology and physiology; treatment modalities; and interpersonal and professional communications.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

By providing a conduit to offshore markets, the Mountain Valley Pipeline would raise the price of gas exponentially, creating an untenable burden for ratepayers. Though loudly proclaimed by our fossil-fuel-connected politicians to be "in the National interest" the MVP would also enable fracking. Fracking creates a myriad of other problems:

For decades our under-financed and understaffed Department of Health and DEP have been unable to effectively oversee fossil-fuel activities--and the gutting of US EPA oil and gas rules promotes fracking. The Halliburton Loophole, where radioactive and toxic crack waste must all be classified as NON-hazardous, has been responsible for poisoning WV drinking water sources since the early 2000s.

Yet, touted by industry as a job-producer, according to the Ohio River Valley Institute, in the most heavily fracked county in West Virginia, Wetzel, the oil and gas promise of

jobs never materialized.

Meanwhile, a recent study conducted by the Environmental Working Group (EWG) states that one fracked drilling site deploys harmful chemicals sufficient "to contaminate more than 100 billion gallons of drinking water to unsafe levels ... more than 10 times as much water as the entire state of New York uses in a single day." These chemicals can be so dangerous that frack cleanup crews report sores covering legs and soles burnt off boots.

Moreover, extraordinarily generous fossil-fuel subsidies hide the true cost of fracking wherein average well production declines by 60% in the first year, according to a Bloomberg report. So needing more of these costly wells to maintain output, polluting and destructive drilling continues with taxpayer dollars! And while fracking created only a few jobs in Appalachia, most of them no longer exist.

For such reasons, in October of 2016, the Pennsylvania Medical Society

called for a moratorium on new shale gas drilling and hydraulic fracturing, stating that "growing evidence has shown [fracking's] increasing deleterious effects outweigh any economic benefit."

However, the US Forest Service is proposing a 125'-wide, 3.5 miles, bulldozed MVP route through the Jefferson National Forest, a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve. Comments are due by 2/21/23.



# Ronald McMillion indicted and arrested for murder of Dee Ann Keene

GREENBRIER COUNTY, (Hinton News) - A Greenbrier County man has been arrested after being indicted for the murder of missing person Dee Ann Keene.

Ronald Ray McMillion, 71, of the Renick area, was indicted for murder on Feb. 14 and arrested at 7:19 p.m.

McMillion was indicted by a Greenbrier County grand jury this week. The indictment reads “on or about February 28, 2014, in the said county of Greenbrier, Ronald Ray McMillion feloniously, willfully, maliciously, deliberately and lawfully did slay, kill and murder one Dee Ann Keene.”

Keene was last seen at McMillion’s home on Leonard Long Road near Renick on Feb. 28, 2014. At the time of her disappearance, a witness told police that McMillion was drink-

ing or using drugs, and that he was so impaired he couldn’t stand up.


The witness said they also heard McMillion say, “I’m gonna kill you, you f\*\*\*\*\* b\*\*\*\*,” to Keene.

The witness said McMillion had a white pistol that he handed to Keene to shoot. He then shot the gun near Keene’s head, close enough for the passing round to ruffle her hair.

After the shot, two witnesses say they left because McMillion was “acting crazy.” They say they tried to get Keene to leave, but she didn’t.

Keene was reported missing on March 4, 2014, and on March 6, 2014, McMillion was arrested for unlawful possession of a firearm and an outstanding warrant for assault from 2012. These charges were unrelated to Keene’s disappearance, but police identified him as a person of interest in her case.

McMillion appeared on the reality television show “Appalachian Outlaws,”

which focuses on ginseng harvesters in the forests surrounding the Appalachian Mountains and ran for seasons in 2014 and 2015. He has a prior criminal history and was arrested for robbery, grand larceny burglary and intent to murder in 1978.

Because of his record, he is not allowed to possess firearms.

In 2016, McMillion pled guilty to a drug charge in federal court, admitting to distributing oxycodone and entered his guilty plea to interstate travel to facilitate an unlawful activity.

According to a press release from the U.S. Attorney’s office, McMillion admitted that in February 2014, he traveled from Renick to the Baltimore area

to obtain oxycodone pills, and that he then traveled back to Renick and sold some of the pills. He further admitted that he had sold oxycodone in Greenbrier County both before and after that trip.

He served 5 years on the drug charge.

The Greenbrier County Prosecutor’s Office has not released any further information about McMillion’s murder indictment or arrest. It is unknown at this time whether Keene’s body has been found or identified.

The West Virginia Daily News has reached out to the Prosecutor’s Office for more information. We will update this story as we know more.

## Hinton 1 of 10 communities chosen for cohort

HINTON, (Hinton News) - The City of Hinton has been chosen as one of only 10 communities across the country to join the Rural Placemaking Innovation Challenge (RPIC) cohort. According to a press release from the Housing Assistance Council (HAC), RPIC is a USDA program: the program funds “planning support, technical assistance and training to encourage placemaking activities in rural communities.

Each chosen community will receive 15 months of support, including capacity-building support, seed grant funding and connection to a peer cohort. A collective gathering for the cohort is scheduled for May 2023 in Alabama for “hands-on rural placemaking training.”

The HAC press release states, “HAC’s RPIC cohort will engage with a curriculum that emphasizes placemaking as a tool for economic development and community cohesion. Community-identified needs will inform the curriculum. In May 2023, the cohort will gather in Newbern, AL, to learn alongside Auburn Rural Studio faculty, students, and partner organizations.”

Hinton is one of two

communities from West Virginia participating in RPIC, the second being Philippi. Each area has a specific goal for the program, and according to Candice Helms, Executive Assistant for the City of Hinton, the town is focusing on tourism and economic development. HAC notes, “RPIC will help Hinton’s city government navigate affordable housing, historic preservation, and other opportunities - especially the prioritization of community needs.” Helms said, “We are thrilled!”



Phased payment approach to be implemented for certain Foster Care families; payments may be delayed

CHARLESTON (Hinton News) – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR), Bureau for Social Services, is notifying certified kinship/relative caregivers and subsidized legal guardians of youth that for the month of February payments will be issued in phases which may result in a delay in their regular payments.

As part of the conversion in January from the Families and Children Tracking System (FACTS) to the West Virginia People's Access to Help (WV PATH), payments have been manually entered with appropriate rates and are now being processed for payment.

Payments to certified kinship/relative caregivers and

subsidized legal guardians are generally issued during the second week of the month, but during February will be delayed by one week for approximately 2,300 children. Adoption subsidy payments will be made the week of Feb. 13.

Payments will return to their normal schedule in March.

In November 2022, EPA released "A Year of Progress Under EPA's PFAS Strategic Roadmap," which underscores key actions taken by the agency during the first year of implementing the PFAS Roadmap. 


