#### **PSC** opens investigation of fire hydrants

CHARLESTON, WV (Hinton News) - On Friday, the Public Service Commission initiated a general investigation to examine the maintenance and testing of fire hydrants.

Although the Commission has no requirements for water pressure or volume for fire suppression, the state Department of Health and Human Resources requires that, "Under no circumstances shall fire flows be less than 250 gallons per minute."

One of the primary charges of the Commission is to require public utilities to perform in a manner designed to safeguard the interests of the public and the utilities. Whether a fire hydrant is owned by a public utility or served by a utility, the utility has responsibilities to assure that the hydrant will perform adequately. If adequate flow cannot be delivered by a particular hydrant, that hydrant is not fulfilling its purpose as part of the water distribution system and the utility owning or serving the hydrant is not providing adequate service.

For that reason, the Commission has ordered that on or before July 28, 2023, all public utility owners of fire hydrants or that serve private fire hydrants shall provide certain information to the Commission. Information sought includes the number of hydrants owned or serviced, their age, descriptions of the infrastructure supporting them, problems or complaints encountered, and maintenance schedules and practices.

PSC Chairman Charlotte Lane said, "We are seeking information and will evaluate when we receive it and then we will determine if further action is necessary."

#### The Servant Has Great Difficulties In His Mission

"Listen, O coastlands, to Me, and take heed, you peoples from afar! The Lord has called Me from the womb; from the matrix of My mother He has made mention of My name. And He has made My mouth like a sharp sword; in the shadow of His hand He has hidden Me, and made Me a polished shaft; in His quiver He has hidden Me. And He said to me, 'You are My servant, O Israel, in whom I will be glorified.' Then I said, 'I have labored in vain, I have spent my strength for nothing and in vain; yet surely my just reward is with the Lord, and my work with my God.' And now the Lord says, Who formed Me from the womb to be His Servant, to bring Jacob back to Him, so that Israel is gathered to Him (for I shall be glorious in the eyes of the Lord, and My God shall be My strength), Indeed He says, 'It is too small a thing that You should be My Servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob, and to restore the preserved ones of Israel; I will also give You as a light to the Gentiles, that You should be My salvation to the ends of the earth.' Thus says the Lord, the Redeemer of Israel, their Holy One, to Him whom man despises, to Him whom the nation abhors, to the Servant of rulers: 'Kings shall see and arise, Princes also shall worship, because of the Lord who is faithful, the Holy One of Israel; and He has chosen You." (Isa. 49:1-7).

The Servant is the speaker in these verses, but He did not take this duty upon Himself—the Lord called Him into this service. Again, the Gentiles are invited to listen (Isa. 49:1). The Lord knew His Servant from His mother's womb—this rules out the possibility of the Servant being the nation of Israel.

The Servant was to "restore the preserved ones of Israel" (Isa. 49:6). Saul of Tarsus who was among this righteous remnant of Israel (Rom. 9:1-8; 11:1-5).

In fulfillment of the words of Isaiah, Christ became a light to the Gentiles. "The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, the way of the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles: the people who sat in darkness saw a great light, and upon those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned" (Matt. 4:15-16; cf. Isa. 9:1-2). After Paul had been rejected by the Jews in Antioch of Pisidia, he said, "It was necessary that the word of God should be spoken to you first; but since you reject it, and judge yourselves unworthy of everlasting life, behold, we turn to the Gentiles" (Acts 13:46).

Jesus told the Syro-Phoenician woman that He had been sent to the "lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Matt. 15:22-24). When the disciples were sent out on the Limited Commission they were told not to go to the Gentiles (Matt. 10:5-6). However, in the Great Commission the apostles were sent to all nations of the earth (Matt. 28:19).







**Activity:** To operate and maintain an existing combined wastewater collection system and an existing 0.625 million gallons per day wastewater treatment plant. These facilities are to serve a population of approximately 6,250 persons in the City of Hinton and surrounding environs including the community of Brooks and the community of Barksdale, and discharge treated wastewater through Outlet No. 001 to the New River, approximately 59.7 miles from its mouth, of the Kanawha River. Tier 1 protection is provided for the uses specified in Title 47, Series 2, Section 6 for Outlet No. 001. Also, to operate and maintain disposal systems, best management practices, and the nine (9) minimum controls for the direct discharge of sanitary wastewater and storm water from Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) Outlet Nos. Coo4, Coo6, Coo7, and Coo9 the uses specified in Title 47, Series 2 for Outlet Numbers Coo4, Coo6, Coo7, and Coo9 through implementation of the facility's Long-term Control Plan. To accept non-domestic wastewater from R. T. Rogers Oil for subsequent treatment and disposal. To incorporate the requirements relative to Title 33, Series 2 of the West Virginia Legislative Rules for the processing and disposal of sewage sludge generated by the wastewater treatment plant. Sewage sludge generated and/ or processed at the permittee's facility shall be disposed of at a sanitary landfill by placing the sewage sludge in the landfill

Also, to acquire, construct,

install, operate, and maintain a wastewater collection system combined sewer overflow (CSO) Abatement Project - Phase 1, consisting of the installation of approximately 5,395 LF of HDPE storm pipe ranging in size from 10 to 24 and 49 catch basins. The project will also include replacement of approximately 265 LF of 12 inch, 10 LF of 15 inch and 360 LF of 18 inch PVC sanitary sewer pipe, 640 LF of 6 inch, 1,740 LF of 8 inch, 605 LF of 10 inch, 1,540 LF of 12 inch, 2,475 LF of 14 inch and 415 LF of 18 inch DIP sanitary sewer pipe, 49 sanitary sewer manholes, replacement of the existing Bellepoint lift FOR station, installation of two (2) grinder lift stations, surface restoration, reconnection of existing lines and all other necessary appurtenances. The wastewater collection system upgrade project shall be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications approved the 6th day of June 2022, and any approved addenda thereto, prepared by E.L. Robinson entitled "City of Hinton CSO Abatement Project (Phase 1) SRF Project No.

C-544550." **Business conducted:** Municipality

Compliance with the combined sewer overflow requirements shall be attained through Administrative Order No. 6567 and any amendments, thereto.

On the basis of review of the application, the "Water Pollution Control Act (Chapter 22, Article 11-8(a))," and the "West Virginia Legislative Rules," the State of West Virginia will act on the above application.

Any interested person may submit written comments on the draft permit and may request a public hearing by addressing such to the Director of the Division of Water and Waste Management within 30 days of the date of the public notice. Such comments or requests should be addressed to:

## A peek into Summers County's past: Doyle Hardware

HINTON (Hinton News) - It is time for another edition of A Peek into Summers County's Past. Every week, local history collector William Jones discusses pieces from his collection and their significance to area history. In this edition, Jones talks about Doyle Hardware which once served the Hinton area.

To begin, Jones notes some of the hardware businesses that have been in Hinton over time. He said, "Over the years, Hinton has had its share of hardware stores and construction suppliers. From Willev's Hardware, Hinton Hardware, Honaker Lumber, Hinton Builder Supply, and Rider Supply & Construction Co. to the company that we will be talking about in this piece, Doyle Hardware." Jones continued, "In doing the research for this article everyone I spoke with said that Jim Doyle, the store's owner, was such a wonderful, cheerful person, and there was no one else quite like him."

"I found his daughter Elizabeth Doyle McGinnis on Facebook and asked her a few questions about her father and Doyle Hardware. She told me that her father opened the store sometime after World War II after he returned from his time in service and stayed his own business. Mr Doyle passed away on January 2,

Hardware was located in downtown Hinton on 3rd Ave. He said, "His store was originally on 3rd Avenue beside Pop's Hot Dog Stand. But later relocated across the street to the original Briers Furniture building that was also on 3rd Avenue due to some architectural issues with the original building. It remained there until the hardware store closed before Doyle's passing.'

"His daughter said that 'dad never knew a stranger'. He was a lifelong resident of Hinton and Summers County. He enjoyed talking and visiting with the people that would come into his store on a daily basis. One of which was my Uncle Bob Thompson. In the 1970s, Uncle Bob had really gotten into collecting antique radios. Mr Dovle was known to have a little bit of everything in his store. So my Uncle Bob made visiting with Mr Doyle a regular stop when he was in town from Charleston to talk about antique radios and swap parts for them."

Doyle and Jones' Uncle shared a common interest. According to Jones, "Doyle too loved antiques and believed in the barter system. He would be called out to do an install in business until sometime in of a part and would often take the organized store and was 1989. He had worked briefly at something in trade for his very amused. In only a few

people money to spend at the other businesses in town. They would give him an antique to According to Jones, Doyle hold as collateral until they could afford to pay it back. This is why his store looked more like an antique store than a hardware store."

After speaking with McGinnis, Jones learned more about Doyle, his store and his life. He noted, "After talking with his daughter, I learned that Dovle had a wealth of knowledge of the local rivers layouts. Being the only hardware store in Hinton that sold large treble hooks, he would often get called when the fire department was searching for a drowning victim. Where he would share his knowledge of the river's geography and tell them where the person's body could be found based on where they were last seen when they would call him to get a hook."

Doyle appeared to be very unorganized, with his store resembling the set of Sanford and Son to an extent. But he could lay his hands on anything a customer ever needed in the store at a moment's notice," Jones said. "A funny side note about Mr. Doyle was that Leo Arthur and Bud Johnson thought they would surprise him while he was with his family on vacation and clean and organize the store. Mr. Doyle returned from vacation to find

Western Auto before opening services. He would even lend days, he had his store back in what most people would consider shambles, which is the organization he preferred.

Continuing the story, Jones said, "This provided many laughs for him and his family for years to come. On one of my uncles many trips to Doyle Hardware to visit Mr. Doyle, he gave him this 1930s tin advertisement for his hardware store that advertised Deming Water Pumps. My uncle and grandfather had placed it on the wall of his barn in Talcott, where it remained since the mid 1970s until last week when I brought it home to write this piece."

To conclude, Jones stated,

"I could go on for pages about the stories that I learned about Mr. Doyle while researching this piece. But two things stick out to me that most people may not remember. One is that in 1976 Doyle ran for sheriff of Summers County. Johnny Jones wrote his campaign song that was played on WMTD, a local radio station. The other is that he was elected and served on the Summers County Board of Education in the 1970s and
