State tax credit changes Community Obituaries

Please take a moment to read about the STATE TAX CREDITS passed by WV Legislation in March 2023 (11B 2526) which includes Vehicles, Small Businesses and Disabled Veterans.

To Potentially Qualify for Refundable Income Tax Credits:

- File Personal Property Assessments timely
- 1. July 1- Sept 1 (Business)
- 2. July 1-Oct 1 (Individual)
- Pay Timely
- 1st half before Oct 1
- 2nd half before April 1
- 1st Personal Property tax payment to qualify for any refundable income tax credit is 2 half of 2023

Personal Property Tax PAID January 2024-March 31, 2024

No credit will be issued for any Personal Property taxes paid before January 1, 2024 Credits will not be issued until 2025.

Types of Refundable Credits beginning January 2024

• Motor Vehicle Property Tax Credit

Who qualifies? Individual motor vehicle owners and Small Business Motor Vehicle owners. What motor vehicles qualify? See back for more information.

• Disabled Veterans Real Property Credit

Who qualifies? Any Veteran who is considered 90-100% disabled by the Department of Veteran Affairs and has been honorably discharged from any branch of armed services in the US. What qualifies? Owner occupied PRIMARY residential real property (Class Ii)- taxes paid timely.

• Small Business Property Tax Credit

Who qualifies? Small businesses with an aggregate personal property appraised value of 1 million dollars or less. Persons holding a working interest in oil and natural gas, or natural gas liquids-producing properties and/or public service companies that are centrally assessed by the state for personal property tax purposes DO NOT QUALIFY.

What qualifies? 50% of the amount of WV Personal Property taxes due and timely paid to a county sheriff by the eligible taxpayer on the taxpayer's personal property.

Effective 2023 Tax Year

NADA values have increased based on July 1, 2022, for the 2023 tax year. It is possible that you will see an increase in the value of your vehicles on your 2023 tax bill.

On September 15, 2021, Governor Justice issued Executive Order No. 25-21 that addressed the nationwide, inflated vehicle val-

ues due to supply issues created from the coronavirus pandemic. This executive order directed the State Tax Commissioner to compile a schedule of automobile values based upon the lowest values shown in a nationally accepted used car guide (NADA) from the current year or the previous year, whichever was lower. The State Tax Commissioner found that the values from the previous year were lower. Therefore, we used the NADA values from July 1, 2020, for the 2022 tax bill.

Unfortunately, some of the values have not decreased in the last year, The Executive Order was a one-time deal in the hopes that the market would recover.

This publication provides general information and is not meant to be a substitute for tax laws or regulations Beginning January 1, 2024, taxpayers are eligible to claim a Motor Vehicle Property Tax Adjustment Creda The first opportunity to claim this credit will be on a 2024 WV income tax return, filed in 2025, for all timely paid property taxes made on vehicles in the 2024 calendar year The same rules will apply for all following years

Who Qualifies?

Individuals, Partnerships, S-Corporations, LLCs, and C-Corporations Leasing companies qualify for the credit. They are required to pass the savings on to the consumer leasing the motor vehicle Contact your leasing company for more information on when you can expect to see the discount

Who Does Not Qualify? Motor Vehicle Dealers

The first molar vehicle property tax payment that will be eligible to qualify for the credit is the payment made for the second half of the 2023 property tax year and it must be paid between January 1-April 1, 2024 Any property taxes paid in 2023 cannot be claimed.

Only Individuals and business motor vehicle owners may qualify for the Motor Vehicle Property Tax Adjustment Credit. The credit is only available for the actual tax paid. If an early payment discount is applied, the credit is limited to the amount actually paid after the deduction of the discount. The following Motor Vehicle classifications, which can also be found online at transportation.wv.gov, are eligible for the credit.

Class A: Cars and Trucks: Passenger cars and trucks with a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less.

Class B: Trucks: Trucks truck tractors, or road tractors with a gross weight of 10,001 pounds or more.

Class G: Motorcycles: Every motorcycle, including motor-driven cycles and mopeds, has a saddle and no more than three wheels

Class H: Buses: Every motor vehicle designed for carrying more than seven passengers or transportation of persons for compensation, excluding taxicabs.

Class T: Trailers: Trailers, boat trailers or semitrailers of a type designed to be drawn by Class A vehicles with a gross weight of less than 2,000 pounds.

Class V: Antique Motor Vehicles: Antique motor vehicles are at least 25 years old.

Class X: Farm Trucks: Used exclusively for the transportation of farm products and supplies by a farmer.

W. Va. Code § 20-15-2: All-Terrain Vehicles: Any motor vehicle designed for off-highway use and to travel on not less than three low-pressure tires, having a seat designed to be straddled by the operator and handlebars for steering control and intended by the manufacturer to be used by a single operator or by an operator and no more than one passenger

Vehicles that do not qualify for the credit include but are not limited to Class C (trailers and semi-trailers). J (taxi cabs). M (mobile equipment) and R (travel trailer) vehicles. To learn more about vehicle classifications, visit transportation.wv.gov.

Taxpayers that do not owe WV income taxes and are not required to file a WV income tax return will be able to file a claim for a rebate in early 2025 of their Motor Vehicle property taxes paid. Continue to check tax.wv.gov for more information and form requirements as they become available.

LYTTLE Father Gregory Patrick Lyttle, 81, of Summit Street, Princeton, died Tuesday, June 27, 2023, at his home, with his family by his side.

Born January 7, 1942, in Bronx, NY, he was the son of the late John William Lyttle, Sr. and Mary Drury Lyttle.

Left to cherish his memory are his loving and devoted family, John William Lyttle, Jr. and wife, Connie, Mary Ellen Campbell, Patricia Joan Hatfield, Robert Michael Lyttle and wife, Gail, David Francis Lyttle and wife, Patricia, Jeanne Marie Schmauss and husband, David; nephews, Charles Hatfield, Conor, Sean, Alex, and John Lyttle; nieces, Jennifer Viger and Kerry MacDonald; grandnephews, Briger and Turner Viger and Colin and Trever MacDonald; grandnieces, Megan and Ellie MacDonald and Hayden Lyttle; dear friend and caregiver, Coty Dennis; wonderful friends and neighbors, Jim and Loretta Lintz and David and Wilma Styers; Sherry Lusk, the caring nurse's aide from Amedisys Hospice; and Amber Dunford and Aiden Butler who assisted with Fr. Greg's care.

Father Greg began his seminary training at the Mary-

knoll Seminary in Ossing, NY. He joined the Order of the Compagnia di San Paola, Milan, Italy in the 1970s. He learned of the Society through his mentor and spiritual director, Fr. Ronaldo Borzaga. In May of 1975, Greg was ordained into the priesthood. His first ministry was in his hometown parish St. Peter the Apostle in River Edge, NJ, as the director of religious education. In 1980, he continued his ministry as a director of religious education at St. Patrick's parish in Yorktown, NY.

In 1984, Fr. Greg went to Manhattan College, Riverdale, NY, to work in Campus ministry. He lived with Fr. Borzaga and 2 other priests. During this time, Fr. Greg served as one of the catholic chaplains for the Kolping Residence in the Bronx and Marian Woods, a home for elderly religious sisters in Hartsdale, NY. In 1995, He served as the Catholic chaplain at the Veterans Hospital in the Bronx. He retired 14 years later, in 2009, and came to West Virginia to care for his mother. He and his sister, Mary Ellen, took care of their mom, until she passed away in 2011 at the age of 100.

During this time many parishioners from Sacred Heart church in Princeton, WV, would sit with his mother, so Greg could continue to say mass at the two parishes in Princeton and Bluefield.

Throughout his priesthood, Fr. Greg traveled to Milan, Italy, and was elected as the Secretary of Priests in the Company of St. Paul. For many years, he traveled to Long Island in the Bahamas to cover various churches for Christmas and Easter. He also covered many churches in West Virginia: St. Patrick's in Hinton, Sacred Heart in Rainelle, Sacred Heart in Springdale; St. John in Marlinton, Sacred Heart in Williamson, St. Peter in Welch, Sts. Peter and Paul in Oak Hill, and St. John Neumann in Powhatan.

Mass of Christian Burial will be held at 11 a.m., Friday, July 21, 2023, from the Sacred Heart Catholic Church on 507 Harrison Street in Princeton with Bishop Mark Brennan as the celebrant. Interment will follow in the Sacred Heart Catholic Cemetery in Springdale, WV. Friends may visit with the family from 10 a.m., until the service hour at the church.

We are continuing the topic of The Suffering Servant. Last week we looked at some of the difficulties Jesus had in His ministry.

The Suffering Servant (Part 1)

Section D

The Servant Will Suffer

“The Lord God has given Me The tongue of the learned, that I should know how to speak a word in season to him who is weary. He awakens Me morning by morning, He awakens My ear to hear as the learned. The Lord God has opened My ear; and I was not rebellious, nor did I turn away. I gave My back to those who struck Me, and My cheeks to those who plucked out the beard; I did not hide My face from shame and spitting. For the Lord God will help Me; therefore I will not be disgraced; therefore I have set My face like a flint, and I know that I will not be ashamed. He is near who justifies Me; Who will contend with Me? Let us stand together. Who is My adversary? Let him come near Me. Surely the Lord God will help Me; who is he who will condemn Me? Indeed they will all grow old like a garment; the moth will eat them up.” (Isa. 50:4-9).

The specific prophecies of Isaiah 50:4-9 were fulfilled by Christ when Pilate “delivered Him to be crucified” (Matt. 27:26).

Servants of God have always had difficulty fulfilling their mission. The Suffering Servant would not flee from His work as Jonah did (Isa. 50:5; Jonah 1:3). We hear our Lord tell those in the first century, “Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness’ sake, For theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when they revile and persecute you, and say all kinds of evil against you falsely for My sake. Rejoice and be exceedingly glad, for great is your reward in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you.” (Matt. 5:10-12).

The striking language of Isaiah 50:6 calls to mind the suffering of our Lord before His journey to the cross, where His back was given to the smiters and where wicked men plucked the beard from off His face (Matt. 26:67-68; 27:26-31).

No reason is given in this section of Scripture for His suffering—we are left to wonder why He had to suffer. Others may desert Him as He goes deeper into His work (Isa. 50:8), but the One who vindicates Him is always near (cf. John 8:29; 16:32). The ultimate vindication of Christ would come through the resurrection from the grave. Paul wrote concerning “Jesus Christ our Lord, who was born of the seed of David according to the flesh, and declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the Spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead (Rom. 1:3-4).

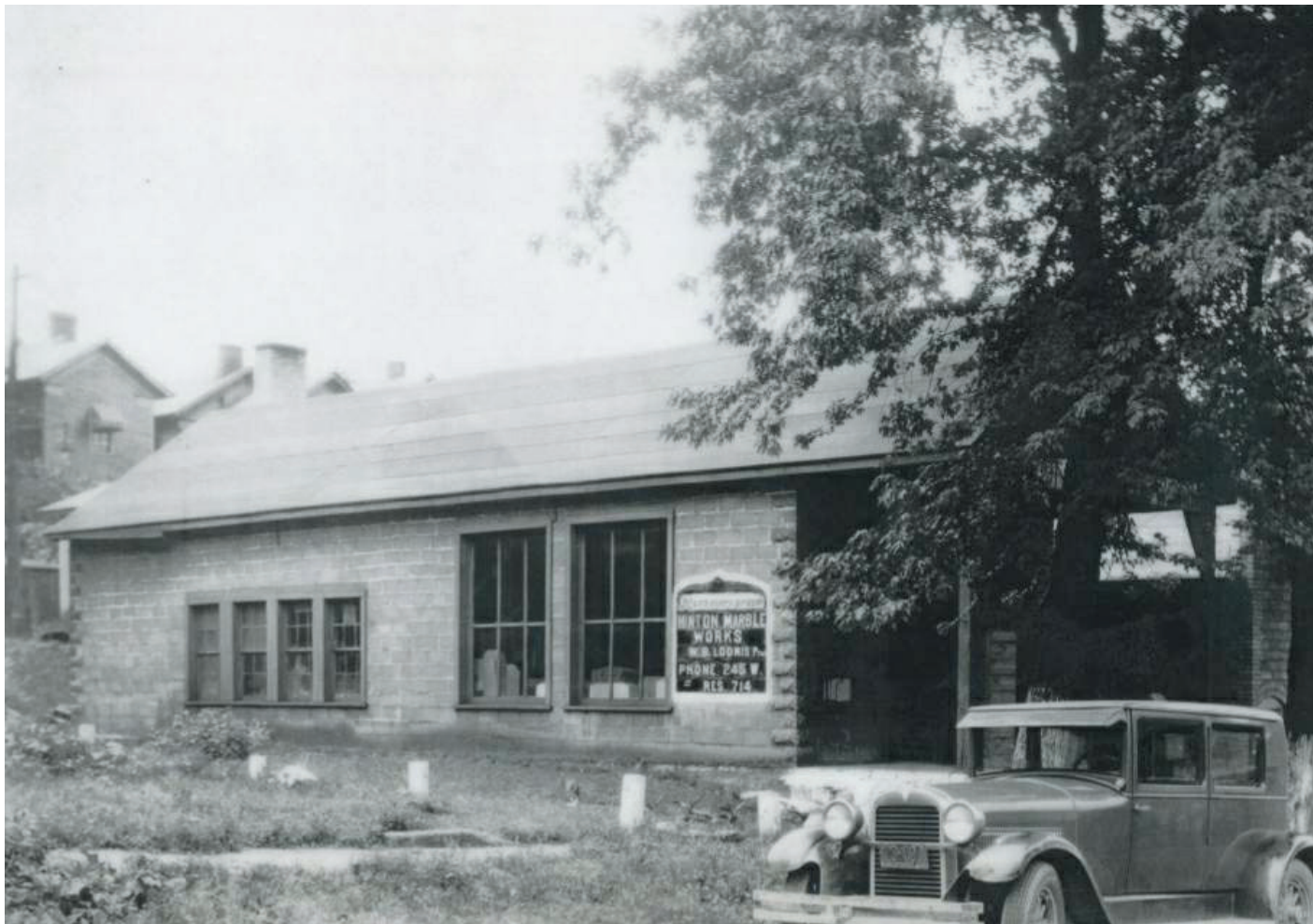

A peek into Summers County’s past: Hinton Marble & Granite Works



Hinton Marble & Granite Works

HINTON (Hinton News) - It is time for another edition of A Peek into Summers County’s Past. A local history collector, William Jones, provides information surrounding pieces from his collection each week. All of the items hold ties to the area’s history. In this edition, we are talking about Hinton Marble & Granite Works.

To begin the discussion, Jones said, “Over the years, Hinton has had numerous successful businesses. The list includes previously mentioned pharmacies, department stores, mechanics, etc. All of which is indicative of a successful railroad town like Hinton, West Virginia. However, one business sticks out to me because it is so different from the others, Hinton Marble & Granite Works, which was on Maple Street.”

According to Jones, “Hinton Marble & Granite Works was created when R. E. Noel, Jr. and C. G. McLaughlin bought out the Loomis Monument Works from the widow of Mr. Loomis in 1939. An advertisement from the Independent Herald May 24, 1939 reads ‘I have recently disposed of the business known as Loomis Monument Works to R. E. Noel and C. G. McLaughlin, who will continue business at the same location, 218 Maple Street, Hinton, W.Va., and will be known as the Hinton Marble & Granite Works.’”

“Loomis’ business was formed in 1898. He carved most of the headstones for pioneer railroaders that had settled in Hinton. He came

to Hinton in 1872 before the town had even been incorporated. I have read numerous historic accounts of the work and the carvings that Loomis did regarding many of the headstones in Hilltop Cemetery. Loomis having arrived in Hinton from the Vermont memorial industry, which was well advanced for its design traits at that time.”

Jones noted the professional regard held for Loomis. He said, “He attended the 1922 convention of the Memorial Craftsmen of America, a leading professional organization that was indicative of his master level of expertise needed to produce memorials of the likes of Lawrence and Rose-Van Zandt sepulchers. It should be noted; the Lawrence family were the largest stockholders in the Hinton Construction Company, so it can be surmised that the Lawrence family had access to expertise other than Loomis for a monument of the Lawrence Sepulcher statue. The great quality of the marble used in the sculptures points to the involvement of the Hinton Marble Works, which likely had the largest stock of marble on hand in the Hinton area during that time.”

“I digress and refer back to R. E. Noel, Jr. and C. G. McLaughlin, the owners of Hinton Marble & Granite Works. This week’s piece is a little odd in that it is an advertisement piece for this business but doesn’t go along with what work we know they did on headstones. This little black box was gifted to me by Gemma Leftwich in 2014 or so. She had received it from Hume Knowlan, who was a very successful business man

in Hinton in his own right.”

Speaking about this week’s item, Jones said, “This box contains 10 boxes of little jigsaw puzzles that would have been given out as an advertising promotion. This is pure speculation, but since the companies only business up until this point in 1946, which is the date inside the little puzzle box, you wouldn’t have had to advertise in this manner to have sold a headstone.”

Jones continued, “I am surmising that Noel and McLaughlin were trying to break into other areas of marble and granite work than just headstones. Because at that time, you were seeing a shift from the more elaborate carved markers from the Victorian and more ornate style to the more standard, plain, mass-produced headstones like the ones used today. I feel they were using these puzzles that were catered to dads, with a construction twist to it, to draw men into their shop in hopes to sell other products to them for their homes.”

To conclude, Jones stated, “The text on the inside of the individual puzzle boxes reads ‘1946 Compliments of Hinton Marble & Granite Works R.E. Noel, Prop. Hinton, West Virginia. If you can’t solve it, bring it in, and we will show you how it can be done.’ Seems like a pretty clever way to entice people

into your store. It draws in the dads of the community; you are throwing a seemingly unsolvable puzzle at them; you further draw them into your store by saying to them if you can’t solve it bring it into our store to let us show you how, and lastly; it is not costing you a penny other than

the initial cost of having the puzzle made because you are not giving them a promotional product per se. You bring them into your shop to solve the puzzle. With the hopes of upselling them on other products, you have to offer. Pretty ingenious marketing gimmick at that time.”
