



Capito announces resources to support West Virginia's take me home transition program for long-term care residents

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (Hinton News) — U.S. Senator Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.), Ranking Member of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies, today announced funding from U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to West Virginia's Take Me Home (TMH) Medicaid Transition Program. The TMH program seeks to identify qualifying residents of long-term care facilities who wish to return to their own homes and apartments in the community and provide them with the support and services they need to do so. The program is supported by West Virginia's Money Follows the Person (MFP) grant through the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (WV DHHR).

"The Take Me Home transition program allows many West Virginians with long-term health care needs to decide for themselves where the best setting is to receive the services they need. For many, that is their own homes and communities. This grant will give West Virginia the needed support and flexibility to help improve the quality of health care and help drive down costs for West Virginia's residents currently living in long-term care. As the Ranking Member of the Labor-HHS Appropriations Subcommittee, I will keep fighting for the resources that help deliver the best standard of care possible for West Virginians," Ranking Member Capito said.

Details on the award are listed below:

- \$5,860,706 for the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (WV DHHR) (Charleston, W.Va.) to support the Medicaid MFP program that aims to aid long-term care patients with getting treatment in a setting of their choice.

Summers County Schools provide meals to students at no cost

HINTON W.Va. (Hinton News) - Students in Summers County will have the opportunity to eat breakfast and lunch at school at no cost for the 2023-2024 School Year through a program called the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP). The CEP was enacted as a result of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act and provides universal meal service to children in high-poverty areas. The CEP serves as an alternative to collecting, approving and verifying household eligibility applications for free- and reduced-price eligible students in high-poverty Local Education Agencies (LEAs). If at least 40 percent of a school’s students are directly certified for free meal benefits, the entire school qualifies for the option. “I am proud that Summers County Schools will be participating in the CEP program to help meet a crucial need for many students in our county,” said David Warvel, Superintendent of Summers County Schools. “We know academic achievement increases when our students are well-fed and ready to learn, and we must provide secure and reliable access to nutritious meals so all stu-

dents have a chance to achieve at the highest level possible.” Summers County expects to have four schools participate in the CEP. The schools participating are as follows: Summers County Comprehensive High School, Hinton Area Elementary School, Talcott Elementary School, and Jumping Branch Elementary School.

The program allows the school system to feed nearly 1,400 students each day. The 2017 Feeding America: Map the Meal Gap data reports high levels of food insecurity and hunger across the country. In West Virginia, more than 14 percent of residents, and over 79,000 children, live in food-insecure households.

Last week we continued Part 2 of The Suffering Servant in which we discussed more of the scripture in Isaiah 52:13-53:12. In this article, we will conclude that discussion concerning The Suffering Servant.

The Suffering Servant (Part 2)

Section D

The Roman Centurion compels Simon to carry the cross the rest of the way from the Fortress Antonia to Calvary (Luke 23:26). “And a great multitude of the people followed Him, and women who also mourned and lamented Him. But Jesus, turning to them, said, ‘Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for Me, but weep for yourselves and for your children.’” (Luke 23:27-28).

At Golgotha, Jesus is thrown back onto the rough wood and spikes are driven into His hands. The cross beam is lifted up carefully, and His left foot is pressed back against the right and a nail is driven in. The Son of God is now crucified! “Now from the sixth hour until the ninth hour there was darkness over all the land” (Matt. 27:45).

“They made His grave with the wicked” (Isa. 53:9) refers to the intention of the government to give Him a state burial. However, He was “with the rich at His death”—this refers to Joseph of Arimathea who “went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus” (Matt. 27:58). Joseph then took the body of our Lord, “wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and laid it in his new tomb which he had hewn out of the rock; and he rolled a large stone against the door of the tomb, and departed” (Matt. 27:59-60).

The God of Heaven was pleased with the suffering of His righteous servant (Isa. 53:10-12). As Peter announced on the day of Pentecost, “Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ” (Acts 2:36).

Conclusion

Why did Christ come to this earth in the form of a man? Listen to how the Hebrew writer explains it: “Inasmuch then as the children have partaken of flesh and blood, He Himself likewise shared in the same, that through death He might destroy him who had the power of death, that is, the devil, and release those who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage. For indeed He does not give aid to angels, but He does give aid to the seed of Abraham. Therefore, in all things He had to be made like His brethren, that He might be a merciful and faithful High Priest in things pertaining to God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people. For in that He Himself has suffered, being tempted, He is able to aid those who are tempted.” (Heb. 2:14-18)

At this very moment that suffering Servant is our glorious Redeemer, the “King of kings and Lord of lords” (Rev. 19:16). “But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels, for the suffering of death crowned with glory and honor, that He, by the grace of God, might taste death for everyone” (Heb. 2:9).

Next week we will begin looking at what the cross of Christ represents.

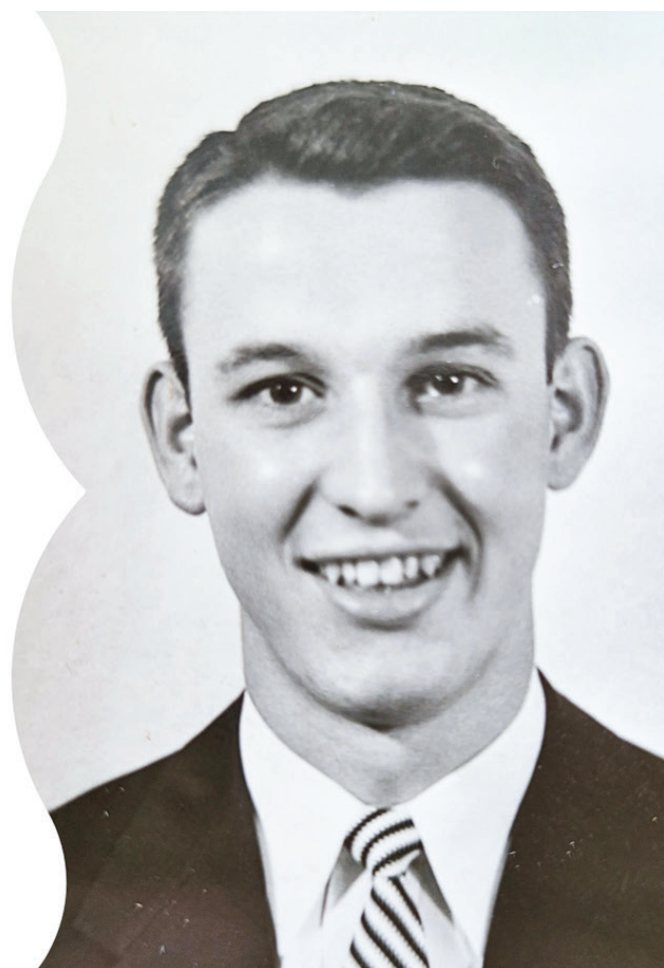
Settling back in Hinton and beginning a family, he founded Rogers Farm Supply in 1958 and served the local community and farmers for 13 years.

School Bus Safety!

A refresher course in school bus safety

The dawn of a new school year is a time marked by change and fresh opportunities. For many children, school marks the first time they are away from their parents for an extended period of time. It also may be the first time they ride in a vehicle other than their parents' cars.

Each school day, 25 million children ride a bus to school in the United States. A school bus is among the safest modes of transport and one of the most regulated vehicles on the road, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Riding a school bus can be a

novel experience no matter a student's age or grade. Kindergarteners may be introduced to the school bus on their first day of school, while older students are no doubt familiar with life inside a school bus. But all students and families can benefit from a refresher course on school bus procedures to ensure this school year begins on safe footing.

- Be a smart pedestrian. Riding the school bus is very safe, but injuries can occur walking to and from the bus stop. Watch for cars backing out of driveways and always look both ways multiple times before crossing streets.

- Remember school bus laws. Most areas of the country have specific school bus laws that include stopping when red lights are flashing on the school bus. Cars must stop whether they're behind the school bus, next to it or on the opposite side of the street facing the bus. Stopping allows passengers to enter or exit the bus safely.
- Stand away from the curb. The National Safety Council advises keeping six feet, or three giant steps, away from the curb while waiting for the bus. Young children should be carefully supervised.
- Be visible. Always cross in

front of the bus, making eye contact with the driver so that he or she knows your intentions before crossing. If you drop something, do not bend down to pick it up. Tell the driver instead.

- Remain seated. Find a seat promptly and remain seated for the duration of the ride. Do not stand up and proceed down the center aisle until the bus has stopped.
- Minimize distractions. Always speak softly and behave so that you do not distract the driver.

School buses are very safe vehicles, but passengers need to do their part to avoid injury.

A Peek into Summers County's Past: The Durango Kid's visit

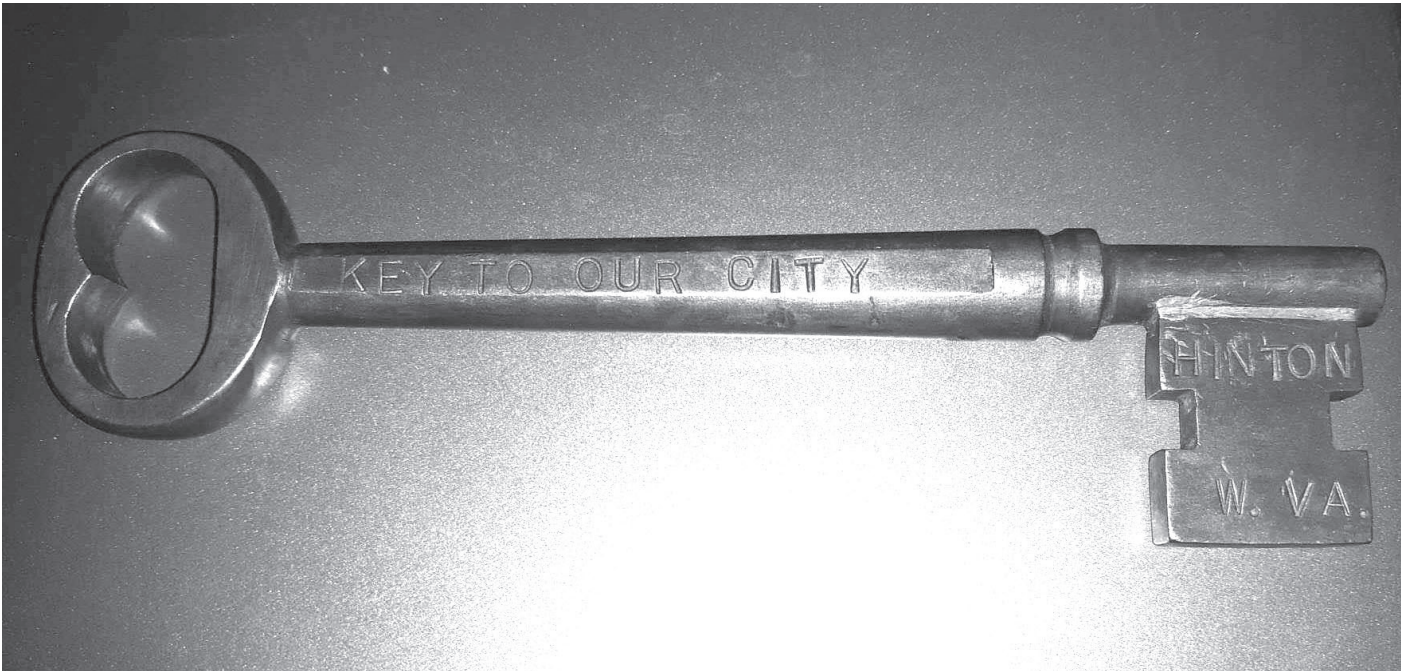


The Durango Kid's headshot from 1948.

HINTON W.Va. (Hinton News) - It is time for another edition of A Peek into Summers County's Past. Each week, local history collector, William Jones, discusses items from his collection and their historical significance. In this edition, the piece of the week is a key to the City of Hinton with an incredible story attached. Here is the tale of when The Durango Kid visited Hinton. Jones began by saying, "This week's story is about a rather rare and unusual piece of Hinton's history. First, I will discuss the brass key to the City of Hinton, and then I will tell the interesting story that was formulated around it. My mother and I went to an auction in what is now the Twin State building, roughly 25 years

ago. I bought several pieces of antique furniture and other odds and ends that day. The thing that stood out the most was this unusual heavy brass key for which I was fortunate enough to end up with the winning bid." In the 1940s, the famous Western star, The Durango Kid, traveled to Hinton. Jones noted, "Hollywood western star Charles Starrett, who was better known as 'The Durango Kid' had this key bestowed upon him for the kindness that he showed a young citizen of Hinton that I will now explain. The key reads 'Key to our City Hinton, W. Va.' and measures over 8 inches long. Starrett made a personal appearance at the Ritz Theatre in 1948 as he was passing through the area. The black and white photo of the man with a gun was

The Durango Kid's headshot from that same year." The Durango Kid in 1948 Jones continued, "In doing some research for this piece, I discovered that Starrett made a personal house call to meet Bill Sawyer, the 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sawyer. You see Bill had waited for weeks to meet Starrett, The Durango Kid, after finding out he was going to make an appearance at the Ritz Theatre. With what had just happened to Bill he considered himself the unluckiest kid ever and said to himself 'I had to go and catch chicken pox and mess everything up.'" "When Starrett found out that he had a fan that had been planning on meeting him but had then gotten sick he decided to meet him himself. After meeting him

Bill soon changed the way he had been thinking and decided he was in fact the luckiest kid ever. The Durango Kid went to his home to meet him, went inside, sat down and carried on a long conversation with him." Not only did Bill get an incredible visit with Starrett, but he also received a keepsake. Jones said, "The Durango Kid left him with an autograph that read: 'To my friend Bill, from his friend Charles (Durango)Starrett.' Something this 9-year-old boy in Hinton, West Virginia cherished. Not only did he have the Durango Kid in his house, who had made a special trip to his home to meet him. All of his friends and the other little boys in town had to go to the Ritz Theatre to meet him. But he had gotten a note from his "friend" The Durango Kid. I would

say he made quite the name for himself around Hinton in 1948." Jones went on to say "His [Starrett's] managers kept trying to hurry him along so that he wouldn't run late for his next appearance in Covington, Va. One of them hadn't wanted him to go meet Bill, fearing that he too would become ill. The Kid told his crew not to worry, 'Aww, (as he waved his manager away) I have had chickenpox before, I've had everything!'" "When he first walked into Bill's house to meet him, the first thing he said to him was "Don't worry about getting chicken pox Bill! Everybody gets it!" After their lengthy visit, The Kid then shook Bill's hand and had his photo taken with him." Then he left to head to Covington for his next engagement."

In conclusion, Jones said, "The city of Hinton presented Mr. Starrett with this key honorarily after he had returned to Hollywood following his engagement at the Ritz Theatre in Hinton. Because he had shown so much kindness and thoughtfulness to a fellow citizen of Hinton. Even though Bill Sawyer was only a 9-year-old child at the time, Mr. Starrett took time out of his big Hollywood schedule to go and personally meet a little boy who had planned to go to meet him but had gotten too sick. And brightened the day for not only Bill but all of the Sawyer family." This brings us to the end of another edition of A Peek into Summers County's Past. NOTICE is hereby given that MOUNTAINEER GAS COMPANY, a public utility, has filed with the PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF WEST VIRGINIA, an application containing decreased rates, tolls and charges for furnishing natural gas service to approximately 218,000 customers at various locations in the Counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Mingo, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood, and Wyoming.

The proposed decreased rates and charges will become effective November 1, 2023, unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission, and will decrease revenue approximately \$50,389,000 annually, a decrease of approximately 24.2%. The average monthly bill for the various classes of customers of Mountaineer Gas COMPANY will be changed as follows:

The decreases shown are based on averages of all customers in the indicated class. Each class may receive a decrease greater or less than stated here. Individual customers may receive decreases that are greater or less than average. Furthermore, the requested decreased rates and charges are only a proposal and are subject to change (increases or decreases) by the Public Service Commission in its review of this filing. Any decrease in rates and charges will not become effective until authorized and approved by the Public Service Commission. If a hearing is conducted, notice will be given of the time and place of hearing.

Anyone desiring to protest or intervene should file a written protest or notice of intervention within twenty-five (25) days following the date of this publication unless otherwise modified by Commission order. Failure to timely intervene can affect your rights to protest any rate adjustments and to participate in future proceedings. Requests to intervene must comply with the Commission's rules on intervention set forth in the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure.
