Morrisey Urges
Consumers to
Use Caution with
Holiday Credit
Card Offers

CHARLESTON W.Va. (Hinton News) — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey is urging consumers to exercise caution when evaluating credit card offers this holiday season.

The advice comes as part of the Attorney General’s Holiday Consumer Protection Week.

Consumers may see an uptick in credit card offers with the Christmas shopping season now in full swing. While it may be tempting to take advantage of the “buy now, pay later” option, the Attorney General urges consumers to verify the credit card offer is legitimate.

“It’s always a good idea to verify any sort of offer you may receive,” Attorney General Morrisey said. “Credit cards can be attractive as they offer consumers the option to pay off purchases over time, but credit card fraud can wreak havoc on finances, so it’s important to be vigilant.”

Holiday credit card offers require a close reading of the contract. Deferred interest promotions may promise zero-percent interest through December 2024, but failure to pay off the entire balance by the promotion period’s end could stick the consumer with an interest charge dating back to the item’s original purchase date.

Before responding to a credit card offer, keep these things in mind:

- Do an online search if the offering company looks unfamiliar. Include the word “scam” after the company’s name to see if it triggers additional results.
- Call the offering company directly if an offer to increase a line of credit looks suspicious. The phone number is often printed on the back of the card.
- Do not provide personal information or click on any link in an email warning of a problem with the card.

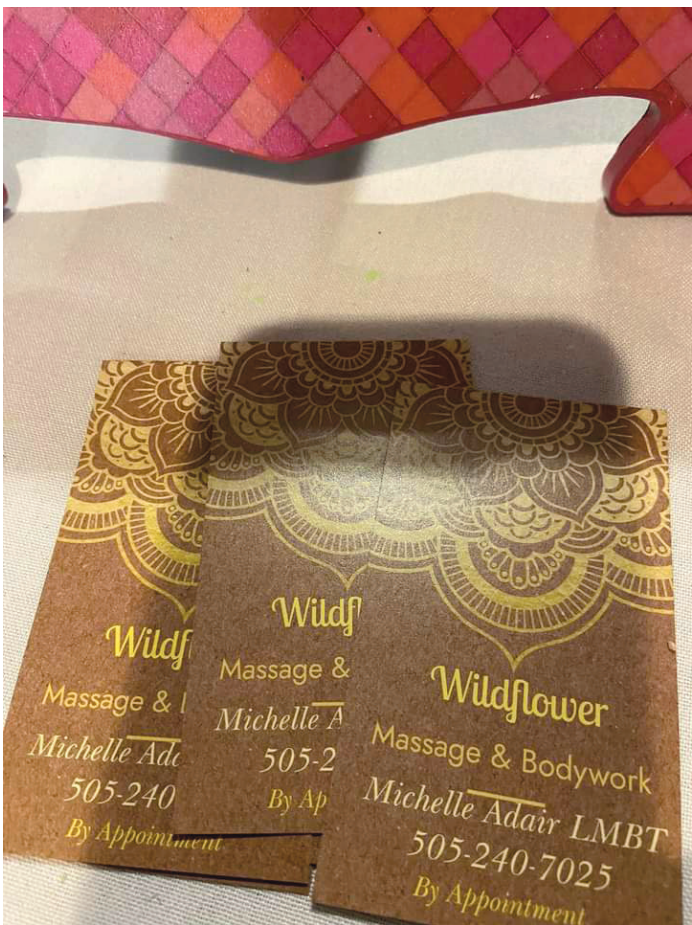

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Last week we looked at how the Ephesians were saved by God’s grace. We continue that thought this week.

Salvation By Grace Through Faith

(continued from last week)

Their Faith Came By Hearing The Word of God

Paul speaks very favorably of the Ephesians in his letter to them. He writes of their exalted position in Jesus Christ “in heavenly places” (Eph. 1:3, 20; 2:6) and of the Church which is the bride of Christ, and the fact that they are that Church which is the visible expression of the “manifold wisdom of God” (Eph. 3:10).

Now, the Ephesians were the inheritors of all the spiritual blessings in Christ (Eph. 1:3) when they trusted in Christ (Eph. 1:13). However, that faith could not exist apart from “the word of truth, the Gospel of your salvation.” Their faith existed “after” they heard (cf. Rom. 10:17). Saving faith is always the result of hearing the Gospel.

Baptism Is Justification By Grace Through Faith

The Ephesians were most certainly baptized (Acts 19:1-5). With respect to their baptism Paul said, “Christ loved the Church, and gave Himself for it; that He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word” (Eph. 5:25-26). What did Christ sanctify and cleanse? It was the Church. With what did Jesus sanctify and cleanse the Church? Jesus used two things in setting the Church apart in holiness: baptism and the Gospel.

Notice that it is “the washing of water,” baptism (Acts 22:16), “through the word,” the Gospel. Baptism is efficacious to our sanctification because God has revealed it (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:36-40).

Our faith is not in ourselves and what we have done (Titus 3:5), but rather it is in His mercy and what He has promised (Col. 2:12). The baptized believer is not trusting in himself so that he can boast and demand a reward as a matter of debt.

Similarly, Peter affirmed that baptism saves us “by the resurrection of Jesus Christ who is gone into heaven and is on the right hand of God” (1 Pet. 3:21-22). Clearly the saving power is not ourselves but the Resurrected Redeemer Who has all power in Heaven and in earth.

We are justified by grace through faith when we believe and obey the Gospel.

Winterplace Ski Resort Begins Snowmaking for the 2023/2024 Season

GHENT W.Va. (Hinton News) – Winter is returning to the Mountains State and the crew at Winterplace is ready. The resort will take advantage of Mother Nature's opportune cooler weather conditions and officially start its first snowmaking push for the 2023/2024 ski and snowboard season. With recent enhancements to its snowmaking system and strategically placed snow guns, the resort will be able to maximize its efficiency and coverage.

"We are excited to get the snowmaking underway and begin building our snow base for the season as conditions permit," said Josh Faber, General Manager at Winterplace. According to Faber, the initial efforts will focus on the Heaven Holler Terrain Park, Wanderer Beginner Area, mid-mountain lifts, Last Chance, and Last Run Trails. "With our powerful snowmaking system and the right conditions, we can convert 7,200 gallons-per-minute of water into snow, which is enough to fill an Olympic size pool in 1.5 hours," said Faber.

Snowmaking requires cold temperatures, low humidity, compressed air, a considerable amount of water and plenty of snow guns. Winterplace's snowmaking system consists of almost 100 fully automated fan guns, which allow the team to take advantage of shorter windows of time and make snow more efficient. There are also 12 miles of underground pipe and two air compressors that provide 12,000 cubic feet per minute of air throughout over 300 snow guns.

Winterplace typically prepares to open mid-December, but if prime weather conditions hold out, the winter season could begin earlier.

3 Ingredient Strawberry Puff Pastry

A beautiful little puff pastry shell filled with cream cheese, topped with strawberries and voila! A sassy little dessert that fits perfectly inside a cupcake sleeve for easy gifting. Must keep refrigerated.

Ingredients

- Yield 12 pieces
- 1 box Pepperidge Farm (or any) puff pastry shells
- 1 48 oz. tub of Philadelphia Cream Cheese Cheesecake Mix
- 1-2 med. Boxes of strawberries

berries

- 1/2 c. powdered sugar
- Parchment paper
- Ice cream scoop

- Preheat oven to 400*
- Slice 12 strawberries into 3 pieces each. Set aside.
- Lay out flat, 12 pieces of pastry shells on a baking sheet lined with parchment
- Dust all with powdered sugar
- Bake for 15 minutes at

NOTICE OF HEARING

On May 31, 2023, Monongahela Power Company and The Potomac Edison Company filed revised tariff sheets reflecting increased base rates and charges of \$207,452,687 or 13 percent in total revenues, including the proposed Infrastructure Investment Program and the Energy Assistance Outreach Program for low-income customers detailed in the filing on a combined company basis. The average monthly bill for the various classes of customers will be changed as follows:

The effective date of the proposed increased rates and charges has been suspended through March 26, 2024 unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission. The increases shown are based on averages of all customers in the indicated class. Individual customers may receive increases that are greater or lesser than the average shown. Furthermore, the requested rates and charges are only a proposal and are subject to change (increases or decreases) by the Public Service Commission in its review of this filing. Any increase in rates and charges will not become effective until authorized and approved by the Public Service Commission.

This matter is scheduled for an evidentiary hearing on January 24-26, 2024. The hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Howard M. Cunningham Hearing Room at the Public Service Commission, 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia. The Commission may cancel the evidentiary hearing for good cause shown. Interested persons intending to attend the hearing should monitor the Commission web docket.

The Commission will receive public comments until the beginning of the hearing. All written comments should state the case name and number and be addressed to Karen Buckley, Executive Secretary, P.O. A Peek into Summers County’s Past: Summers County Memorial Building

HINTON W.Va. (Hinton News) - Editor's Note: Each week, local history collector William Jones discusses items from his collection and their historical significance. In this edition, he is delving into the topic of the Summers County Memorial Building.

Just like the Talcott School Gymnasium, which was recently rededicated as the Dallas "Bud" Mann Gymnasium, the Summers County Memorial Building was also a WPA project. The foundation of this building was not part of the WPA project as can be seen printed on the official advertisement card featured in one of the photos.

The concept behind the construction of the Summers County Memorial Building was to serve the community as a gathering place for children of the county in an affordable setting to be used for fundraising activities, after-school events, blood drives and many other types of events. Such as the story I wrote about the country music show my grandfather Bernard Thompson put on in 1969 and used it for the venue.

Prior to my wreck, my mother and I used to be involved with the Hinton Hope Foundation. We held many events in the Memorial Building, such as Hinton Game Night, where we had local celebrities serve as the hosts, country music shows, which led to various contestants making big names for themselves on a local scale and others.

During my tenure with the Hinton Hope Foundation, we felt the need to give back to this venue that had brought so much to our community. Over the years, the metal folding chairs had become

worn out and broken over the decades of use. So we created "Chairs for Hope." We held numerous fundraising events to purchase the new seating for the Memorial Building.

The new black metal and rubber chairs were purchased at Sam's at a cost of around \$22 apiece. It felt great to give something back to the place that had let the foundation hold events in its early days to grow and prosper. After nearly a century of having been built as a "community building," which "is a building that is dedicated towards the creation or enhancement among individuals within a regional area or with a common need or interest." This building has always served the community as just that!

When I used to work the elections at the Pence Springs precinct, we had our training in this building. Even recently, on Nov. 11, when the Veterans Memorial Wall was rededicated in Hinton, the ceremony was held inside the building and then we walked over to the wall to conclude the service. Where new plaques for all branches of the service were unveiled. It is fitting that the courthouse, Memorial Building, Post Office and Veterans Memorial Wall are all in what has come to be known as "courthouse square." All major events in Hinton and Summers County seem to happen in this location.

The building is virtually identical to the way it was when it was first constructed. From the beautiful woodwork around the stage to the tile floor, to the railing around the center area of the foyer that used to be open to looking down to the floor below. But for safety reasons, it had to be floored to close it off. The proximity

of the Memorial Building to the courthouse allowed for a much-needed upgrade that, not only the Memorial Building needed, but the courthouse needed also.

In 2004 an addition was put between the two structures with brick that matched up to the original brick of the Memorial Building to install an elevator to serve both structures, thus making them both fully handicapped accessible. Something that could not have been said since the courthouse was constructed in 1875.

The two items you see in the photos with this article were recently gifted to me by a fellow Summers County history and antique collector. The newspaper is the Hinton Daily News from Nov. 9, 1938. It is when the Memorial Building was first completed. The title of the article reads, "City Plans Huge Celebration Summers County War Memorial Building to be Dedicated Friday."

In reading this original newspaper article, I learned that the building was first planned as early as 1923. At that time, Murvill Cook Post No. 6 Hinton American Legion spearheaded a movement for a war memorial. Its construction took over a complete decade and had two big obstacles during its construction which delayed it even further.

The blue booklet you see is an original dedication booklet for events pertaining to the ceremony to be held on Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1938. Aside from the program being well organized in the book featuring three performances from the Hinton High School Band, it has ads from various businesses in Hinton and throughout Summers County placed in this booklet. Most of these I

had heard of over the years but there are a few that are new to me.

Cox Department Store, Acme Limestone Company, Buckland Transfer Co., Virginia Laundry Co., John W. Cook, Meadows Furniture Company, Hinton Builders Supply Co., Citizen Fire Insurance Agency, Garry & Sheffey, Johnson & Gwinn Inc., Welfley's, T. A. Honaker, Wak Company Gas, Hinton Motor Company, C. Lawson Deeds, Esso, C.J.'s Stores, Third Ave. Meat Market, Masonic Fountain, Maddy Brothers.

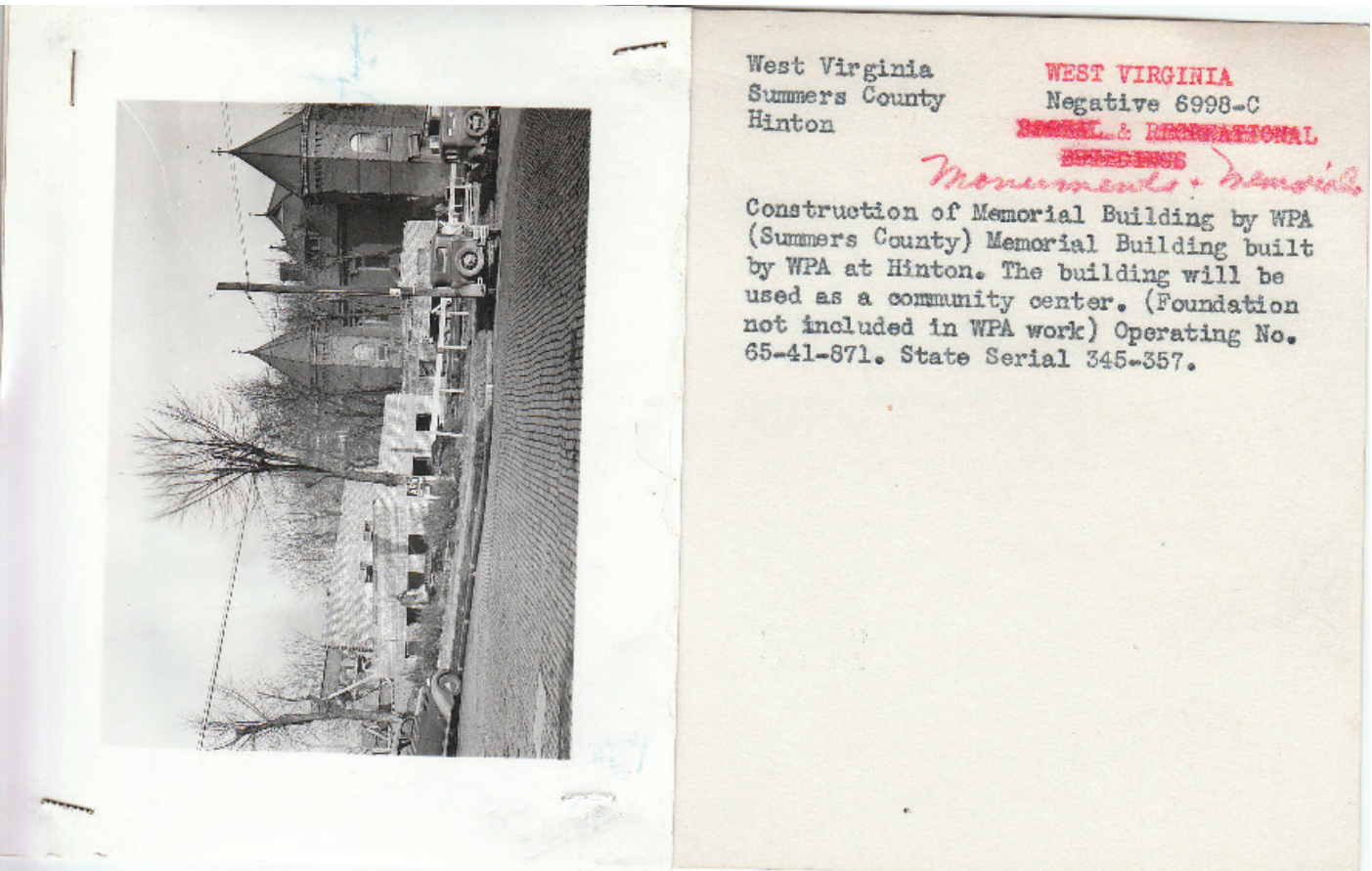
