



Senator Ryan Weld, Vet the Vote Team Up to Recruit Veterans and Families to Be Poll Workers

CHARLESTON W.Va (Hinton News) – Senate Majority Whip Ryan Weld, R-Brooke, announced a partnership with the non-profit organization Vet the Vote to encourage West Virginia's veterans and their families to volunteer as poll workers in this year's elections.

West Virginia will need more than 8,400 volunteer poll workers to carry out both this year's Primary and General elections. By appealing to West Virginia's veteran community, this initiative hopes to ease the burden on the State's county clerks as they seek to find a sufficient number of poll workers this year.

"Without a doubt, veterans are the most trusted demographic in the nation. And we can think of no better group to step up and help solve our election volunteer shortage," Weld said. "We are asking our veterans to serve once again and help ensure that all West Virginians who are able to vote in this year's election can."

"As trusted members of the community with a deep commitment to service, veterans and military families can play a unique role in addressing the urgent need for poll workers here in West Virginia and across the country," Vallone said. "And by encouraging them to answer this call, we hope to forge a new tradition of patriotic civic engagement among veterans and military families."

The West Virginia County Clerks Association has stepped up to assist with the Vet the Vote effort to ensure participation in each of the state's 55 counties. Lewis County Clerk Cindy Rowan, who serves as the Association's president, said several members have family who are veterans, and she is hopeful they can assist with spreading the word.

"We think our veterans, who know how important public service is, will make great poll workers," Rowan said.

Senator Weld, who is also chairman of the Senate Military Committee, is the lead sponsor of Senate Resolution 61, Encouraging WV military veterans to volunteer as election workers in 2024 statewide elections. The resolution highlights the critical skills veterans bring to the administration of elections and that their participation as poll workers will help continue our citizens' strong sense of confidence in the electoral process.

To volunteer as a poll worker in the May 14 Primary, please stop by the elections office of your county clerk before poll worker training classes begin on April 15.

Virginia man arrested in Summers County

SUMMERS COUNTY W.Va. (Hinton News) - A Virginia man has been arrested following an alleged incident in Summers County on Jan. 28. The individual, John Thomas Muller, 27, of Narrows Virginia, is facing charges related to a reported theft.

According to the criminal complaint, police were called to a home in Forest Hill on Jan. 28 where the

victim stated that items had been stolen from two vehicles and an outbuilding. De-walt hand tools, chainsaws, a weed-eater and cash were among the items reported missing. Reportedly, a neighbor noted seeing a red Chevrolet Silverado with Virginia plates sitting along the road on the morning of the incident. Additionally, the victim allegedly told officers that they had hired someone in the past who drove a vehicle matching

that description and gave the name "John Muller."

In early February, the criminal complaint notes that the investigating officer was contacted by a Captain with the Giles County Sheriff's Office with possible information on the case. The complaint also reports that the Giles County Captain stated that a red Chevrolet Silverado had recently been involved in an accident in the area and contained multiple tools matching

those listed in the theft report. The driver of this vehicle was identified as John Thomas Muller.

Reportedly, Virginia officers spoke with several individuals who said Muller had brought some of the tools in question to a local garage before selling some of the items.

Later, around Feb. 15, the criminal complaint states the investigating officer traveled to Giles County and met with a Virginia

State Trooper. While there, individuals reportedly confirmed that Muller had been seen in possession of some of the tools described.

Following the trip to Virginia, the investigating officer requested a warrant be issued for Muller. According to the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Muller was booked into Southern Regional Jail on March 5 and is being held on a \$12,500 bond.

She is survived by her children, Kathy Jane Talley, Thomas Edward, and Betsy Ann Dalstra; sister, Phyllis Parker; grandchildren, Chris Edward Stone, Kara Ellen Adkins, Ezra James-Delaney (Katie), Camryn Joy, and Skyler Rose; great-grandchildren, Jacob, Logan, Jessie, and Samuel; nieces and nephews; and her lov-

After raising their children, Joy decided to pursue a degree in elementary education. When she retired, she had earned her Master in education and had taught for over 20 years.

Throughout her life, she was a member of Extension Homemakers, a 4-H club leader, member of the Delta Kappa Gamma education society, and First United Methodist Church, where she attended.

During her life, she traveled extensively. She had pen pals in Australia and England, whom she visited her. She and her sister, Jean, traveled Spain, Italy, France, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, Canada, and throughout America.

Joy was an avid gardener and wildflower watcher. She attended the annual Wildflower Pilgrimage at Blackwater Falls for over 25 years and went on many adventures with friends and family hunting wildflowers.

Joy was a remarkable

woman, who grew up in a time before the Great Depression, saw the beginning and end of World War II, lived in the time of tremendous industrial growth, helped her husband build two homes, nurtured her family with her gardening and preservation skills, entered college in her mid forties, fulfilled her dream of an education and teaching career, and lived to enjoy her retirement on the banks of the Greenbrier River.

Funeral services to celebrate Joy’s life were held at 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 5th, 2024, at Pivont Funeral Home Chapel in Hinton with Rev. John Sauvage officiating. Interment was in Restwood Memorial Gardens. The family received friends from 3:30 p.m. until 5 p.m., Tuesday, at the funeral home.

Conversion Of The Ethiopian Eunuch

In the eighth chapter of the book of Acts we find one of the many cases of conversion in the New Testament. These examples have been recorded for us to demonstrate how men enter the kingdom of God. Like every other case of conversion in Acts, God used the “foolishness of preaching” (1 Corinthians 1:21) to reach the alien sinner. An angel of the Lord sent a preacher named Philip to teach an Ethiopian nobleman (Acts 8:26).

Little is known about the Ethiopian. In all likelihood, he was a black man who had turned to Judaism. We know he was a sincere individual, for he had traveled over 1,000 miles, from Ethiopia to Jerusalem, to worship God (Acts 8:27). It would be hard to believe a man would travel that far across the desert by chariot just for “show.” I know folks who claim to love God but won’t drive fifteen minutes in a new car to assemble with the saints. His dedication to God is further shown in Acts 8:28, where we find him “reading Isaiah the prophet” as he traveled.

The Ethiopian was a very humble man. When Philip drew near the chariot he asked the Ethiopian if he understood what he was reading. He replied, “How can I, unless someone guides me?” (Acts 8:31). After this, Philip got up into the chariot and “preached Jesus to him” (Acts 8:35). In the course of preaching Jesus, Philip spoke of water baptism. We know this because the Ethiopian said, “See, here is water. What hinders me from being baptized?” (Acts 8:36). Philip responded “If you believe with all your heart you may” (Acts 8:37). The man then confessed, “I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God.”

His confession was an acknowledgment of the Lordship of Christ. In Romans 10:10 we read, “For with the heart one believes to righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made to salvation.” This confession, as noble as it is, will not bring salvation by itself. “Even the demons believe—and tremble” (James 2:19).

After his confession, “he commanded the chariot to stand still. And both Philip and the eunuch went down into the water, and he baptized him” (Acts 8:38). New Testament baptism was always by immersion in water. It is referred to as a “burial” (Romans 6:1-4). Sprinkling or pouring instead of immersion was introduced by men centuries after the completion of the New Testament. I am certain Philip was not a Baptist preacher, for you will notice that no church voted on the Ethiopian before he was baptized. When a man is saved, the Lord adds him to His church (Acts 2:47).

Furthermore, Bible baptism is “for the remission of sins” (Acts 2:38). We are baptized in order to obtain salvation. Some people have changed the divine order of things by teaching salvation comes at the point of faith, before and without water baptism. This doctrine is out of harmony with the word of God (Mark 16:16; Acts 22:16; 1 Peter 3:21). After his baptism, the Ethiopian “went on his way rejoicing” (Acts 8:39). He had good reason to rejoice, for he was now a child of God, redeemed by the blood of Christ. He was now a “new creation” (2 Cor. 5:17).

A Peek into Summers County’s Past: Early photographs

SUMMERS COUNTY W.Va. (Hinton News) - I recently acquired several original early 1900s photographs taken by an early Summers County photographer, Oscar Hutchison. Hutchinson had a photography studio in Hinton around 1900, but it is unknown where it was located.

Making a living as a photographer in these parts during that time was difficult. For that reason, he ended up owning the Dodge Brothers car dealership in Ronceverte. He passed away at 49 years old from a sudden stroke. His family inherited his vast archives of historical photography from this area.

Both of the photographs in this article came from his grandson, retired Summers County High School teacher Tom Hutchison. One is of a steam-powered well drill located somewhere in the county in the 1910s.

The other is of a steam tractor in the Forest Hill community in 1924. It is hard to believe now that seeing steam-powered well drills and large iron-wheeled tractors was so rare at that time it was photo-worthy, which is why there is such a large gathering of people in photos of this nature. Yes, neighbors helped their neighbors

then, but getting your picture taken was a special treat for them too.

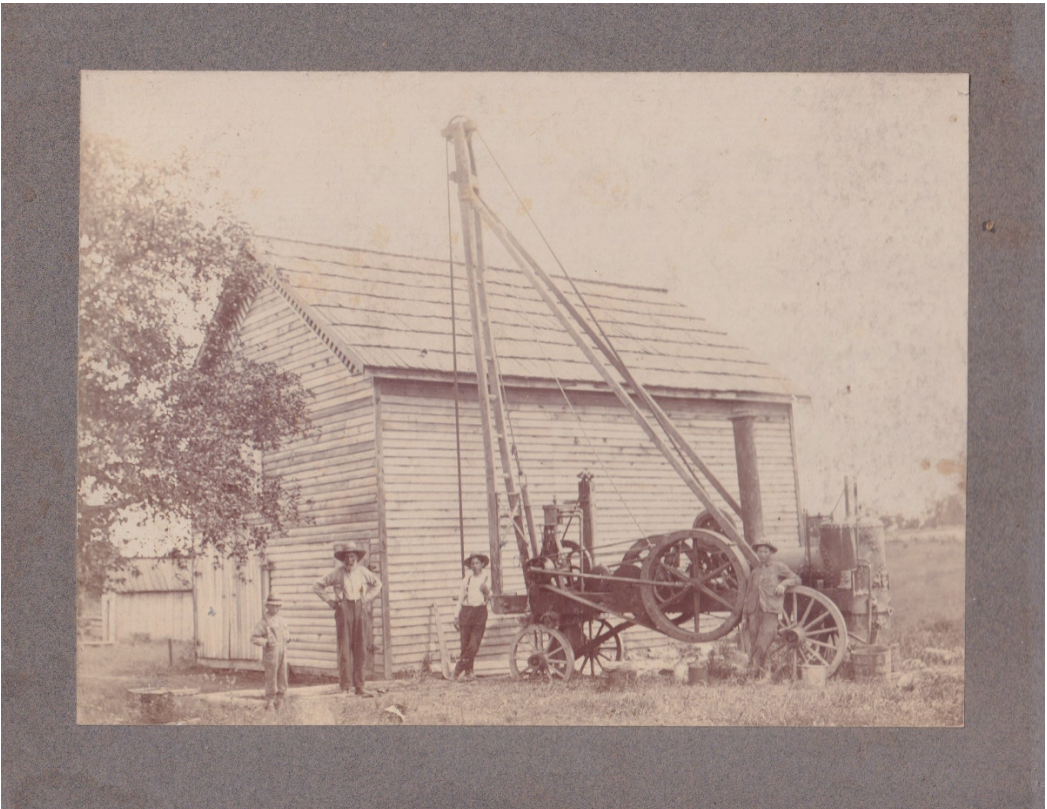
Writing this piece reminded me of another piece of Summers County history with a family connection Richard Leftwich told me. Richard’s son, James, and I had always been good friends throughout college. It wasn’t until I came home with him once from school and his Uncle Steve and I were talking that I realized we had a family connection.

My Great-Grandfather, Earl Jones, whom I never got to meet, had married his mother’s sister Ruth Smith in the 1920s. Earl and Ruth moved to Charleston where he drove and retired from having driven, a Greyhound bus. I have a large 1940s Greyhound bus line poster

that belonged to him, his little Greyhound dog tie pin and his Greyhound lighter. I am not a hoarder as my family calls me I promise.

According to the story, during World War II, Grandpa Earl obtained used tires from a Greyhound bus. One weekend, while visiting family in Summers County, he brought these tires and installed them on an iron-wheeled tractor with the help of his brother-in-law, Malcolm Smith.

Thus creating one of if not the first rubber-wheeled tractors in Summers County. This took place in the Judson community. I am an “old soul” I know, but you do not hear of things like this happening anymore. I must have been born during the wrong

time because I have always been more interested in things like this than those other people my age were and are interested in.

I should add that Tom Hutchison has his Grandfather, Oscar’s, antique camera and tripod that he used to take these historic photos. Tom like me, loves antiques and preserving history. It always amazes me to uncover connections with people or in this case, “your family” that you never con-

nected the dots about.
