



PSC cuts in half Mon Power, PE rate increase proposal

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (Hinton News) – The Public Service Commission of West Virginia gave its approval Tuesday to a broad-based compromise that cuts in half a \$207 million rate increase proposed by Monongahela Power Co. and The Potomac Edison Co.

Instead of approving a 13 percent hike, the Commission endorsed a multiparty joint stipulation to allow rates to increase by 6.4 percent, or \$105 million. In a separate order, the Commission approved a joint stipulation in the companies' depreciation case, resulting in an additional \$33 million increase; effective on the first day of the month after the effective date of the new rates in the base rate case.

The companies filed this major rate increase case, called a base rate case, on May 31, 2023. A total of 1,865 protest letters opposing the rates were received by the Commission.

A key stumbling block to a settlement in the case was net metering, which determines how consumers who generate their own power and sell it to the power companies would be charged for transmitting their output along company lines.

The companies and staff witnesses testified that all current rate payers are subsidizing the companies' 1,700 net metering customers. As a result, the companies sought to impose a charge on future net metering customers, but agreed not to apply it to current customers for a 25-year period. That compromise was approved by the Commission.

Existing net metering customers received a retail rate of 11 to 13 cents per kilowatt hour for power their solar panels send to the grid. The companies sought to cut that in half for future customers. The compromise set it at about 9 cents a kilowatt hour. It is set to take effect on Jan. 1, 2025.

High School coaches selected Bryce Taylor, Ryan Oliveros, Brandon Isaac and Tyson Adkins as the recipients.

The award is given in memory of Dickie Noel, a 1982 graduate of Hinton High School. Noel played football in Summers County Midget League, Hinton Junior High and Hinton High School. He was captain of his high school team. Noel displayed Heart, Hustle and Character every practice and every game. He was selected to the Summers County Football Hall of Fame in 1988 and was

inducted posthumously. He is the only player from Hinton High School or Summers County High School to have his football jersey number retired - #41. He went on to play football at Concord College with the same Heart, Hustle and Character displayed in high school. He was later sidelined due to a shoulder injury, but he was always there to encourage his teammates.

Noel also excelled on the baseball field, beginning with the Hinton Little League, where he was selected to the All Stars

team and later played in the Senior League Baseball program. He umpired and mentored Hinton Little League baseball in his high school and college years.

He was a 1986 graduate of Concord College with a degree in Travel Industry Management. He was Assistant Manager of Sam Snead's Tavern at the Homestead Resort in Hot Springs, Virginia at the time of his death in September 1988.

Former Beckley Resident Launches New Book in Hinton

HINTON W.Va. (Hinton News) - A new historical novel, "The Saga of Virginia Ham" by former Beckley resident, Phyllis Campbell Whitley will be launched at the Summers County Public Library on Saturday, April 20, between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. with book signings. Light refreshments will be served.

Whitley says Virginia Ham was an enigmatic woman. Even so, every person has a story. Jenny was born in 1860 in southern West Virginia and finished her journey on this earth on New

Year's Day, 1946. Her life seemed a mystery to all in the community.

A few years ago, it was suggested that Whitley research the history of Jenny's life and perhaps write a book. She started with the two facts she knew; She was old and lived alone in a little house near her grandparents' home on the Greenbrier River, and a cousin said she was a witch.

She began interviewing people living in that area, researching the lives of people there, throughout the state, and around the

world for information that might have impacted Jenny's life. Ideas for a story began to form, an outline was developed. Over the next two years, a historical novel unfolded.

In her saga, Jenny chronicles her life story beginning in 1860. Items from her old, cherished candy box greatly enhanced her memories.

Finally, it is now 2024, and Jenny's story has been written, published, and ready for readers. Whitley says, "As a historical novel it is the truth as I believe it to

It is my observation that neither the Democratic Party nor the Republican Party is waiting for the 2024 U.S. Presidential Election Results before implementing the 2025 Republican Plan for the United States of America. Opening The Door: Repentance

(Part 1)

Since the fall of man in the Garden of Eden, God has been calling upon mankind to repent. Brother H. Leo Boles once commented, "When God shut the gate of paradise to Adam, He opened the door to repentance."

The Bible is filled with the command to repent. The basic task of the prophets, God's spokesmen in times past, was to get the people to repent. Over and over again in their writings is found the command to "repent." The message of Jesus while He was on the earth was one of repentance. "I tell you, no; but unless you repent you will all likewise perish" (Luke 13:3, 5).

Repentance was part of the fundamental message which after the death, burial, resurrection and ascension of Jesus was to be sounded out to Jews and Gentiles in every nation. "Then He said to them, 'These are the words which I spoke to you while I was still with you, that all things must be fulfilled which were written in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms concerning Me.' And He opened their understanding, that they might comprehend the Scriptures. Then He said to them, 'Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem'" (Luke 24:44-47). The apostle Paul, while standing on Mars Hill and preaching to the Athenians, said, "Truly, these times of ignorance God overlooked, but now commands all men everywhere to repent, because He has appointed a day on which He will judge the world in righteousness by the Man whom He has ordained. He has given assurance of this to all by raising Him from the dead" (Acts 17:30-31). The apostle Peter, writing in 2 Peter 3:9, said, "The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some count slackness, but is longsuffering toward us, not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance."

Jesus emphasized the necessity of repentance when He said that if your hand caused you to sin it would be better to cut it off and have life than to continue to possess it and be lost eternally (Matt. 18:8-9). He was not advocating mutilation of the physical body in this text. Rather, He meant for His hearers to understand that they needed to cut off worldly things from their lives, repenting of them and then abstaining from them.

Repentance Defined

Repentance is "the change of mind of those who have begun to abhor their errors and misdeeds, and have determined to enter upon a better course of life, so that it embraces both a recognition of sin and sorrow for it and hearty amendment, the tokens and effects of which are good deeds..." (J.H. Thayer, *Greek-English Lexicon of the New Testament*, p. 406). W.E. Vine defines it by stating that, "In the New Testament the subject chiefly has reference to repentance from sin, and this change of mind involves both a turning from sin and a turning to God" (*Vine's Expository Dictionary of New Testament Words*, p. 963).

Repentance is a turning. In relation to one's spiritual condition, it is turning from sin and the pursuit of sin and turning to God and the pursuit of righteousness. It is the change of mind that causes one to forsake living in and for sin and to desire to live for God and in accordance with His will.

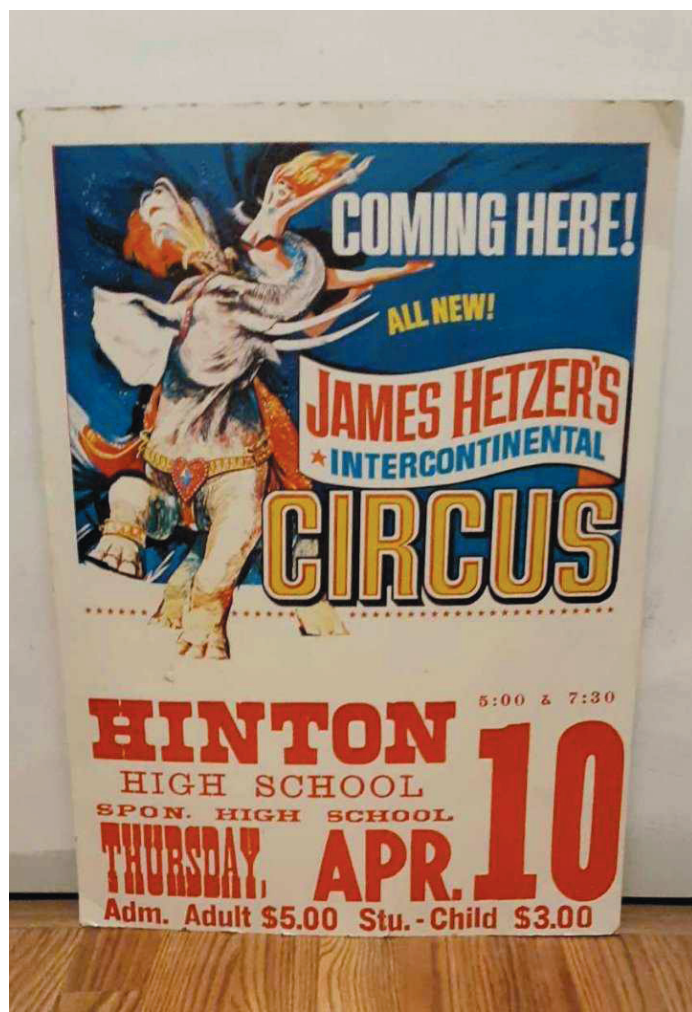

A Peek into Summers County's Past: James Hetzer's Intercontinental Circus

HINTON W.Va. (Hinton News) - I have not been able to dig up much about this piece. When my Grandmother, Bea Thompson, passed away in 1999 it was uncovered in her attic along with several other

local pieces of local ephemera in Tornado, West Virginia and I, of course, had to keep it to add to my collection.

My mother can remember her parents taking her, she would have been 14 years old at the time.

It must have been quite the show because \$5 for an adult and \$3 for a child was quite the haul then. The cost is the equivalent of \$37.75 and \$22.65 retrospectively. It was called the James Hetzer's Intercontinental Circus and was held at the Hinton High School in Hinton.

Again, I have uncovered very little about this subject matter, but it is such an interesting piece I couldn't help but show and tell about it. I have found posters for this same circus when it was held in Clarksburg, West Virginia; Elkins, West Virginia; and Fairmont, West Virginia in addition to this one held in Hinton. It must have been just a standard poster with the circus theme on the upper half, and then the show location, date and time were stenciled on it for the various towns where the show was held. I have found references for the "James Hetzer's Japanese Circus" and the "James Hetzer's European Circus," as well.

The company was based out of Huntington, West Virginia. In doing exten-

sive research I have seen an ad on one of these posters "Hetzer's Theatrical Productions Huntington, WV." James Thomas Hetzer (October 9, 1915-June 19, 1987). He was a theater producer, dancer, musician and songwriter. The James Hetzer Intercontinental Circus ended in April 1987. I have only found one newspaper article about the show in Hinton. It was an article about a circus this company did in Lewisburg around the same time and casually mentions this show in Hinton.

He was a graduate of "HHS" and Marshall. When I first saw this reference to Hetzer's education, I assumed it was "Hinton High School." Because I had never seen that abbreviation for anything but Hinton High School. But after learning it was a company based out of Huntington, we can further assume it meant "Huntington High School."

My grandparents kept anything like this piece because they could see the future historical value of things of this nature. Most people would have tossed

posters from events like this in the garbage after it was over. Just as calendars, flyers, newspapers and local advertisements were most likely discarded as trash.

But thankfully, they saw the significance in things like this and instilled it in my mother, who then raised the "local and family

historian" as I like to call myself. It might be as most of my friends and family call me, "pac rat." Either way, I am glad they did it because someone has to save these things for future generations.
