

Governor Patrick Morrisey Visits Hinton, Signs Bills Related to DEI, Puberty Blockers and Procedures for Minors

HINTON W.Va. (Hinton News) – Today, Governor Patrick Morrisey ceremoniously signed Senate Bill 474, which ends Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) programs in West Virginia, and Senate Bill 299, which prohibits hormone blockers and gender transition surgeries for children under the age of 18. “I pledged to root out DEI and eliminate the woke virus in West Virginia, and today, we’re following through

on that promise,” said Governor Morrisey. “We will lead with common sense, treat every citizen the same under the law, and protect children from making life-altering decisions at a young age.”

Governor Morrisey was joined by legislators and supporters at the Summers County Memorial Building for the ceremonial signing. The Governor highlighted his previous actions to end DEI, including issuing

an executive order and signing the Riley Gaines Act (HB 456). Senate Bill 474 eliminates diversity, equity, and inclusion programs, trainings, activities, offices, and officers from the executive branch, primary and sec-

ondary schools, and institutions of higher education of the state and requires higher education institutions to reallocate any unexpended funds that would have been used on diversity, equity, and inclusion projects. Senate Bill 299 prohibits physicians, physicians assistants, and advanced practice registered nurses from providing gender reassignment surgery or gender altering medication to a person under 18 years of age, and prohibits telehealth service providers from prescribing or dispensing gender altering medication to a person who is under 18 years of age.

Wayne Ryan Named Executive Director of WVSSAC

Ryan is currently the associate executive director and held the title of assistant director from 2016-2023. He graduated from Hinton High School in 1982 and was a multi-sport athlete who played baseball at Alderson-Broadus. He will assume his new role on July 1, 2025, once the current executive director David Prince, officially retires.

Police Investigate Trespassing in Hinton, Recover \$850 in Allegedly Stolen Tiles and Balusters

HINTON W.Va. (WVDN) - According to a criminal complaint, on May 3, around 11:32, an officer received a call for trespassing from Summers 911. It was in the vicinity of Main Street in Hinton. The caller stated that there was a green SUV parked on his uncle’s property and that the property owner was out of town and nobody should be on the property.

When the officer arrived at the location, he found the green SUV, a Toyota RAV4 with West Virginia registration, parked in the driveway behind the house. As the officer looked around, he reportedly came across two individuals exiting the house. They were identified as Amber Nicole Yancey and Joel Franklin Price. According to the criminal complaint, Yancey and Price told the officer that they

were there to meet another person and that they were picking up property from him. They reportedly went on to say that they had loaded up items to be dropped off at another location. The officer proceeded to contact the owner of the property and confirm that he didn’t know the individuals and that they didn’t have permission to remove items from the home. When the officer looked in the ve-

hicle, he found items belonging to the owner, including three boxes of 12×12 tile valued at approximately \$120, 14 boxes of 8×8 tile valued at approximately \$550, and 24 stair balusters valued at approximately \$180. The approximate value of everything together is \$850. Yancey and Price both allegedly stated that the front door was open and that they didn’t break into the residence by force.

Customers can’t be forced into electronic payments

CHARLESTON W.Va. (Hinton News) - Customers, even those with an email address or text on file with a utility, should not be forced into paying their utility bills electronically, the Public Service Commission of West Virginia ruled Tuesday.

“Paperless billing should be an ‘opt in’ choice for utility customers in West Virginia,” the Commission wrote in an order involving West Virginia-American Water Co. (WVAWC).

“The company is encouraged to increase its efforts to promote customer participation in paperless billing,” the Commission noted.

“The company should consider incentivizing enrollment in paperless billing by offering a fair discount to customers who enroll in paperless billing.”

This issue was part of a petition filed by the company on June 7, 2024, to modify water and sewer rates.

The company proposed at that time automatic enrollment of customers in WVAWC’s paperless billing program if the customer had an email or text on file or had registered for the company’s online MyWater portal.

Staff resisted the proposal, saying the change would be burdensome to seniors and customers who lack reliable internet service.

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A Peek into Summers County’s Past: Postcards

P E N C E SPRINGS W.Va. (Hinton News) - Forgive my lack of detail in this week’s series, but while at this month’s meeting of The Ballengee Farm Club, I realized it is Thursday and my story is due tonight. So, after rushing around the house after I got home, I pulled out an album of old local postcards.

These three postcards of Pence Springs I ran across are of the same area; the second and third are part of a larger panoramic view looking from Pence Springs proper, facing the depot with the river behind it.

The first one was made from a much earlier photo, prior to the bridge being constructed across the Greenbrier River in the early 1900s. The guests staying at the hotel would get off the train at the depot and were taken by horse and wagon in the early days to a ferry to cross the river and continue up the dirt road over to the hotel and the spring.

Note the “Pleasure Lea Camp” written in quotes along the bottom with Aug. 7- 27, 1916 after it. I have never seen a reference to this camp in Pence Springs except for this postcard. It also says 1916, which is roughly around 15 years after the bridge was constructed. It is in-

teresting that photos that were this old were still being used for postcards at that time.

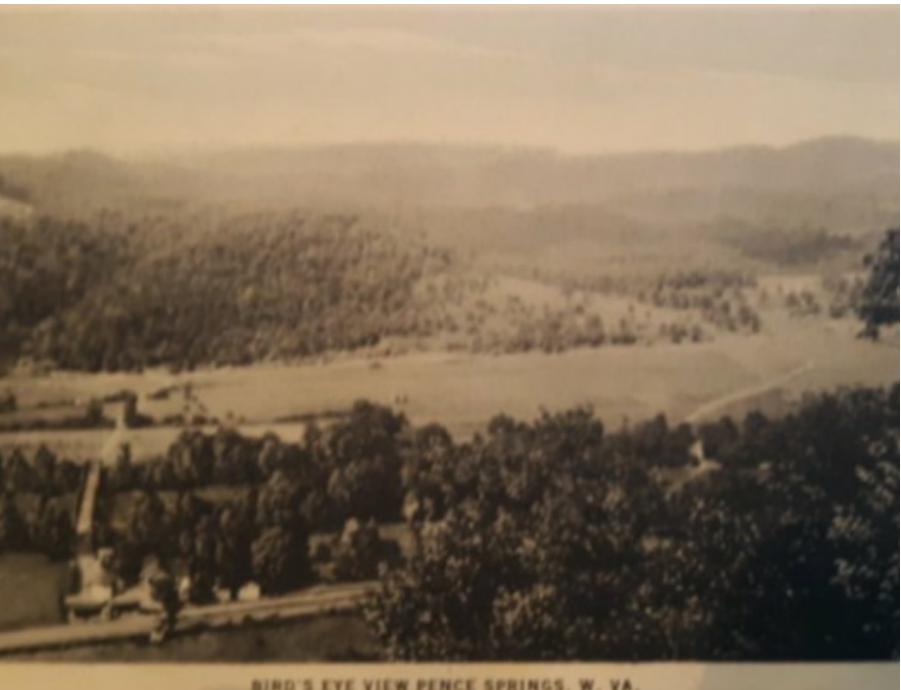
The large wood-frame hotel can be seen in the upper left-hand corner. Rhodes and Pyles Store and Post Office on the right-hand side. The Lahey Boarding House is touching the white line of the postcard. The brick yard in Pence Springs would have been somewhere across from that long, skinny island on the right.

The two other postcards were printed from a long panoramic photo. The large house you see in the center of the photo was the home of a Rhodes brother who owned Rhodes and Pyles Store. It was built by my great-great-grandfather, L. W. Thompson. Remember in one of my previous stories, I mentioned the three Rhodes

brothers who built stores and homes in Talcott, Lowell and Pence Springs. The large home you see on the bank of the river on the right-hand corner was the Lahey Boarding House. It sat within walking distance of the depot. Which can be seen in the bottom left-hand corner of the other postcard. Rhodes and Pyles Store can be seen to its right.

The ferry or toll house that was used prior to the bridge being built. And then after it was built to raise the funds to complete its construction sat behind the store. And it is still there to this day, it is currently being used as a camp.

The bridge is completed in this view, and as you can see, there is nothing visible along the road that goes next to the river from that time to the hotel and the spring.

Remember, at this time, the community of Valley Heights was thriving above the spring and had its own store and post office. So it could function separately from the town of Pence Springs and even had its own hotel and spring

called The Valley Heights Hotel.

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Series On Calvinism (Part 15) Irresistible Grace

(Last week we completed the study of limited atonement as we looked at scriptural objections to that doctrine. This week, we will begin to look at the idea of irresistible grace.)

The fourth basic doctrine of Calvinism is Irresistible Grace. It is also called Efficacious Grace or Invincible Grace.

Irresistible Grace is the idea that the elect, those who Calvinists believe have been unconditionally elected to eternal life, cannot resist the grace of God and heaven’s determination to save them. As those elected to damnation can do nothing about it, those who are elected to salvation can do nothing to resist. The grace of God overwhelms them in such a way that even if they wanted to they could not repel it.

John Calvin believed that only a direct operation of the Holy Spirit could make one who is “dead in sin” hear the gospel and believe. This means that the gospel would not be sufficient to convict and convert the heart of the sinner. Calvinists say the Lord, through the Spirit, must appear to the sinner in a direct, miraculous way in order to bring about the sinner’s conversion. And if the sinner is one whom God had predestinated to life before the foundation of the world, that sinner **must** submit to God’s grace as revealed to him by the Spirit.

We will examine this fourth tenet of Calvinism, Irresistible Grace, by seeing how Calvinists themselves express this doctrine, considering the proof texts used to support it, and offering some Scriptural objections to it.

Irresistible Grace Expressed

The Westminster Confession of Faith expresses this doctrine by saying, “All those whom God hath predestinated unto life, and those only, he is pleased, in his appointed and accepted time, effectually to call, by his word and Spirit, out of that state of sin and death in which they are by nature, to grace and salvation by Jesus Christ; enlightening their minds spiritually and savingly to understand the things of God; taking away their heart of stone, and giving unto them an heart of flesh; renewing their wills, and by his almighty power determining them to that which is good, and effectually drawing them to Jesus Christ; yet so as they come most freely, being made willing by his grace.” (Chap. X, Sect. 1)

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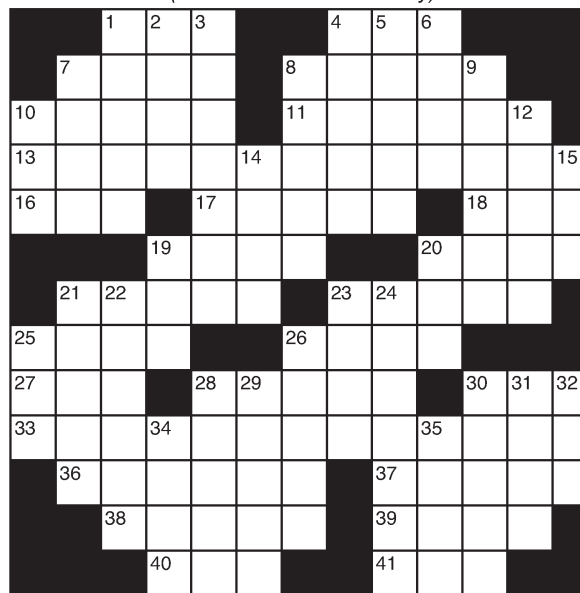

WEST VIRGINIA-AMERICAN WATER COMPANY**

Notice is hereby given that WEST VIRGINIA-AMERICAN WATER COMPANY, a public utility, has filed with the PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF WEST VIRGINIA a tariff containing a requested increase in rates, tolls, and charges for furnishing water service to approximately 172,000 customers in Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Cabell, Clay, Fayette, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Mason, Mercer, Morgan, Putnam, Raleigh, Roane, Summers, Wayne, and Webster Counties, and a tariff containing a requested increase in rates, tolls, and charges for furnishing wastewater service to approximately 1,800 customers in Boone, Fayette, Jefferson, and Morgan Counties.

The water tariff filing will also directly or indirectly affect those customers of the following public service districts, regional development authorities, municipalities, or other governmental subdivisions who, under agreements approved by the Public Service Commission, are charged water rates that are in whole or in part based on the rates of the Company:

Boone County Public Service District
Cumberland Public Service District
Flatwoods Canoe-Run Public Service District
Jumping Branch-Nimitz Public Service District
Kanawha County Regional Development Authority
Lashmeet Public Service District

Lewis County Economic Development Authority
New Haven Public Service District
Oakvale Road Public Service District
Putnam County Building Commission
Salt Rock Public Service District
Webster County Economic Development Authority

Some of the customers receiving service from these entities under Operation and Maintenance Agreements with the Company also pay a surcharge in addition to the metered water rates. These surcharge amounts were approved by the Public Service Commission in prior cases, and those surcharges will not increase or otherwise be affected by this filing.

The proposed increased rates and charges will become effective March 1, 2026 unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission. The proposed increases include an allocation of the wastewater revenue requirement to the water revenue requirement to support the same percentage increase in rates for both water and wastewater customers. On a total basis, the Company proposes \$46,376,033 in additional annual net water revenues over present rate revenues, or an overall increase in revenues of approximately 22.0 percent, and \$1,453,680 annually in additional net wastewater revenues over present rate revenues, for an overall increase in revenues of approximately 25.8 percent. The \$46,376,033 increase in annual net water revenues consists of an increase in base rates of \$58,935,579 in annual revenue and a decrease in the Company's Distribution System Improvement Charge ("DSIC") of \$12,559,546 in annual revenue. The \$1,453,680 increase in annual net wastewater revenues consists of an increase in base rates of \$1,595,142 in annual revenue and a decrease in the Company's Wastewater System Improvement Charge ("WSIC") of \$141,462 in annual revenue.

The Company proposes implementing the increase in two steps: the first step under Addendum Period 1 with rates effective March 1, 2026, and the second step under Addendum Period 2 with rates effective March 1, 2027. The step 1 increase for water service in Addendum Period 1 is \$31,816,550, or approximately 15.1 percent over present rate revenues, net of DSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation. The step 2 increase for water service in Addendum Period 2 is \$14,559,483, or approximately 5.7 percent over Addendum Period 2 going level revenues, net of DSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation. The step 1 increase for wastewater service in Addendum Period 1 is \$767,720, or approximately 13.6 percent over present rate revenues, net of WSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation. The step 2 increase for wastewater service in Addendum Period 2 is \$685,960, or approximately 10.8 percent over Addendum Period 2 going level revenues, net of WSIC and inclusive of the wastewater to water allocation.

The Company is further proposing a Universal Affordability Discount Tariff for water and wastewater service that includes multiple tiers of discounts based on different levels of household income stated as multiples of Federal Poverty Level ("FPL"). The driving principle behind the Company's proposed Universal Affordability Discount Tariff is to provide all participating customers discounts such that the expected bill for basic water or wastewater service will be no more than 3% of their annual household income.

The proposed tariff discounts are as follows:

Dear Recycle Lady

Dear Recycle Lady,
I will be canning again this summer, and I have several metal flat lids and rings that are no longer usable. Can these flat lids and rings be recycled? **Canner**

Dear Canner,
The Recycling Center doesn't accept the flat metal lids with a rubber seal. These lids are a single-use product and are not recyclable. It does accept all metal canning screw rings, and they are recycled with steel cans. Additionally, all screw-on metal tops, like those that are on jars of items such as jam or spaghetti sauce, are also recyclable with steel cans. As with all recyclables, they must be clean and dry before going into the recycling bin. When replacing

your old flat tops, consider purchasing some of the new reusable split-type canning lids with eco-friendly, non-toxic silicone seal rings. There are also glass lids available that are made to be used over and over and are safe for both water bath and pressure canning.

Dear Recycle Lady,
Is it better to put unwanted food in the trash or down the disposal? **Puzzled**

Dear Puzzled,
Good question, and one for which there is no real good answer. More than 21.5 million tons of food waste is generated annually in the US, according to stanfordmag.org. If this amount of food waste were sent to the landfills, it would clog

the landfills, and the amount of carbon dioxide and methane produced would be equal to two million cars on the road. Putting food waste in the disposal is not much better as it stresses sewage treatment plants and can potentially pollute the waterways. In general, considering climate impact and energy use, the disposal is better than the trash. However, there are several types of food that should not be put in the garbage disposal, according to master plumber Karel Williams. Stringy vegetables like asparagus, corn husks and celery can wrap around the disposal's blades, causing clogs, jams or damage to the disposal and/or your plumbing sys-

tems. Coffee grounds can accumulate and also clog both drains and plumbing. These foods would best be put in the compost. Putting hazardous materials down the drain can cause damage to both the disposal and the plumbing, and it's also illegal.

Dear Recycle Lady,
Lately, I have received solicitation letters in red and black envelopes. Are these envelopes recyclable? What about the plastic windows in envelopes? Do they need to be removed before recycling? **Reader**

Dear Reader,
Locally, red and black envelopes are not recyclable, even if the backs of the colored envelopes are white. The fibers of these dark colored en-

velopes are difficult to bleach enough to make them usable. Red envelopes are particularly difficult to recycle as the printing process makes use of ink and other chemicals that are harmful to the environment. The plastic windows in envelopes do not need to be removed. When paper is processed, called pulping, windows or staples are filtered out. White envelopes can be recycled, but they are also good for composting. However, they need to be shredded or torn into small pieces before being added to the compost. Shredded paper is a good source of carbon for the compost, while food scraps and grass provide nitrogen. Together, they balance

out the green (nitrogen-rich) and brown (carbon-rich) materials needed for good compost.

Kudos to Folgers Coffee for packaging their Expedition Blend of coffee in a cardboard box specifically designed for recycling and made with renewable resources! This product is available locally. Hopefully, it is an indication of more plastic-free packaging to come.
