



Beyond the Interstate: Discovering the New Aventures by Rail

WEST VIRGINIA (Hinton News) - When planning a trip, one of the most important aspects is the travel method. From road trips to international flights, there are plenty of options available; however, there is one often overlooked choice: trains. In southern West Virginia, Amtrak runs the Cardinal line for all of your travel needs. Every Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday, this line runs between Chicago and New York City with stops in multiple West Virginia and Virginia cities making it an excellent option for day trips. Travellers can easily go from Hinton to White Sulphur Springs or Charleston to Clifton Forge and back again.

Not only is train travel a convenient way to take a trip, but it is also generally cheaper than flying. Other benefits include plenty of leg room and reclining seats that do not impede the passenger behind you in coach, generous free luggage options, several food and drink options to suit varying tastes and general ease.

While the convenience and cost are major draws, the true selling point of the Cardinal is the unpar-

alleled scenery. As the train winds through the heart of southern West Virginia, it traverses the New River Gorge National Park and Preserve. Passengers are treated to views of the rugged canyon walls and the rushing New River—vistas that are completely inaccessible by car. During the autumn months, this route becomes a moving gallery of vibrant oranges and reds, offering a perspective on the Appalachian wilderness that you simply cannot get from an interstate.

Choosing the train isn't just about the destination; it's about embracing a slower, more intentional pace of life. Many of the stops along the West Virginia route, such as Hinton and Alderson, feature historic depots that harken back to the golden age of rail travel. These stations often sit in the heart of small, walkable towns, allowing travelers to step off the platform and immediately immerse themselves in local culture, boutique shopping, and historic architecture without the need for a rental car.

For those who struggle with the cramped confines of modern air travel, the Cardinal is a breath of fresh air. Beyond the generous legroom, the train offers free Wi-Fi and individual power outlets

at every seat, making it an ideal environment for those who want to get some work done or stream a movie while the landscape rolls by. If you're looking for a more social experience, the Lounge Car provides a space to stretch your legs, strike up a conversation with fellow travelers, or simply enjoy a coffee while staring out of the oversized observation windows.

Pro Tip: Because the Cardinal

only runs three times a week, it is wise to book your tickets in advance, especially during the peak leaf-peeping season in October when the route is in high demand.

Witness Statements and Alleged Confession Lead to Arrest in Pipestem Shooting

PIPESTEM W.Va. (Hinton News) - According to a criminal complaint, on Jan. 18, an officer received a call at approximately 2:40 a.m. to respond to the vicinity of Rock Ridge Bar in Pipestem. While enroute, the officer was reportedly informed that an individual had been shot. When the officer arrived

on the scene, he started an investigation.

According to reports, the victim, who has not been identified, was transported to a local hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

The officer made contact with three witnesses who allegedly named an individual, later identified as Raesan Smith, as one of the suspects in the shooting. Several witnesses also reportedly saw Smith brandishing a firearm prior to the shooting.

A little while later, Smith was hiding inside a vehicle in the parking lot, according to the complaint. Of note is that Smith was reportedly in possession of the same clothes as those described by the witnesses. Smith was then arrested.

The officer interviewed

Smith after advising him of his Miranda Rights. Smith reportedly waived his rights. During the interview, Smith allegedly confirmed he discharged his firearm four times. The complaint states that Smith also told the officer that he had been aiming his firearm at another person when the incident occurred. According to

the complaint, Smith also said he disposed of the firearm before being arrested. There was a residence within 500 feet of where the firearm was reportedly discharged.

Smith was booked into Southern Regional Jail; however, at the time of publishing, Smith is no longer listed as an inmate at SRJ.

A Peek into Summers County’s Past: Hinton News Front Pages Through the Years

SUMMERS COUNTY W.Va. (Hinton News) - This week’s piece kind of writes itself. The papers you see here are a collection of only the front pages of the Hinton Daily News throughout the years. This was done for a special 75th anniversary edition of the paper, showcasing some of the most memorable local, national, and international news stories and headlines.

As for a local story of interest, the Wednesday, January 14, 1942 headline was “DRAVO AWARDED BLUESTONE DAM CONTRACT.” The first paragraph of the story

reads... ”the amount was approximately \$10,000,000.” With inflation, that equates to \$206.403,821.66 today.

On Tuesday, June 6, 1944, the headline was “INVASION BEGINS Landings Made In Northern France; Nazis Acknowledge Penetrations At Cherbourg”. Tuesday, May 8, 1945, reads “VICTORY Truman Announces Surrender; Warns Japanese To End War.” Monday, August 6, 1945, “New Atomic Bomb Dropped on Japan. Tuesday, August 14, 1945, “WAR ENDED Allied Forces Ordered To Cease Firing.”

A local story that made national head-

lines at the time, Thursday, March 1949, “Bluestone Bridge Section Falls; Five Dead”. Wednesday, June 10, 1953 “3 Crewmen Die When Engine Explodes.” Of national or rather international interest;

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May, July 21, 1969 “MAN WALKS ON MOON.” Wednesday, May 4, 1960 “Senator John Kennedy Visits In Hinton Today”. Then, only three years later, on Friday, November 22, 1963, “President

Kennedy Assassinated”. Thursday, June 27, 1929, “Preparation and Building of Bridge Interesting Story” and

then several individual stories about the local bridge follow.

International news again: Thursday, December 10, 1935 “Abdication of King is Announced.” Sunday, December 7, 1941 “WAR WAR Declared by Japanese on U.S., Britain”. Wednesday, April 18, 1906 “Earthquake Destroys San Francisco.” Wednesday, April 8, 1912 “Roosevelt Pays Hinton Short Visit.”

One section was just articles of local interest, such as “Telephone Makes Debut Here In 1887 Between Offices In Court House.” “200,000 Feet of Pipe Required To Serve Gas Construction Here”. The great many local ads and photographs are simply fascinating. There are 25 front pages included in this series. And for a local history enthusiast like me, it is an absolute treasure to have in my collection.

Last week we were looking at the way out of religious confusing. We ended with the Lord adding daily to the church those who were being saved in Acts 2:47.

In His church, we can enjoy the unity of which Paul wrote to the Ephesians...

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all. (Ephesians 4:4-6)

But finding His church and enjoying this unity is experienced only as we follow Jesus as the way out of religious confusion.

Finally, let me point out that Jesus is...

THE WAY TO ETERNAL LIFE

Death is inevitable (unless Jesus returns first), and as the author of the epistle to the Hebrews wrote, it is followed by judgment:

And as it is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment, (Hebrews 9:27)

In this way, death becomes the door, either to eternal life or to eternal condemnation. In His description of the Judgment scene, Jesus outlines only two alternatives...

“And these will go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.” (Matthew 25:46)

To die in Jesus is to die in the way to life eternal! As the apostle John wrote in the book of Revelation:

Then I heard a voice from heaven saying to me, “Write: ‘Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on.’ “ “Yes,” says the Spirit, “that they may rest from their labors, and their works follow them.” (Revelation 14:13)

Yet another wonderful blessing in following Jesus as “**The Way**,” to find that He is the way to eternal life!

Conclusion

I hope that I have sparked your interest in wanting to learn more about Jesus as “**The Way**.” As I mentioned at the outset of this study, the other lessons will elaborate upon these great blessings provided only through Jesus.

My purpose in this series is two-fold...

Next week we will begin an in-depth study looking at Jesus, the way to a better life.

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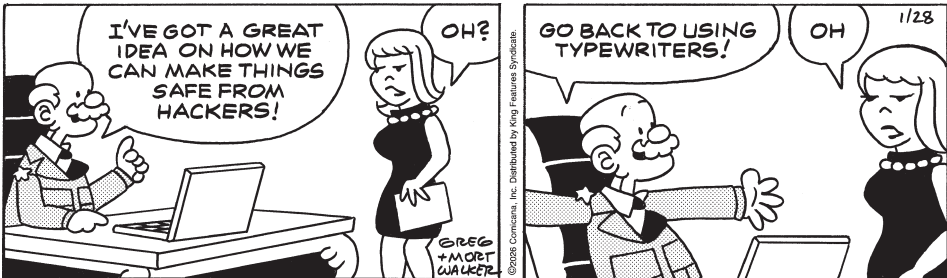
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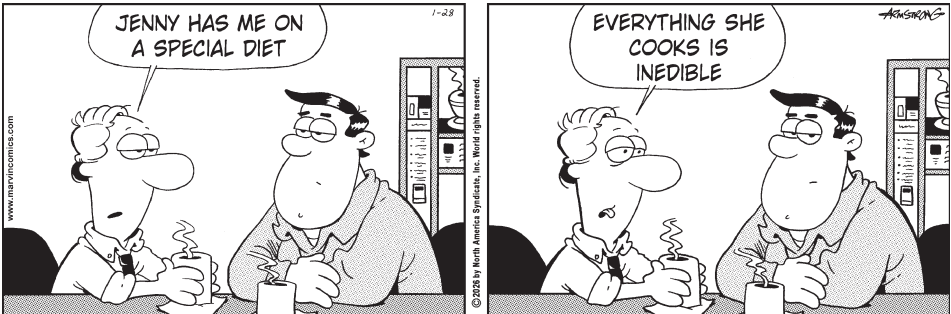

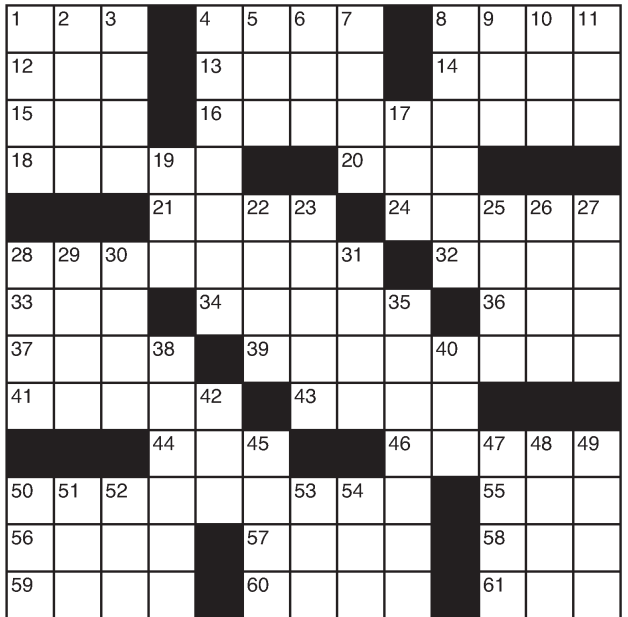

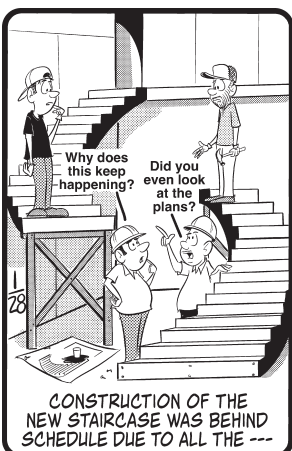

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WorkForce West Virginia announces February 4 Statewide Virtual Job Fair

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (Hinton News) — WorkForce West Virginia today announced the next date in a series of Statewide Virtual Job Fairs. Both employers and job seekers are invited to participate in the virtual event on Wednesday, Feb. 4, from 1 to 3:30 p.m. “We invite you to unlock your potential at WorkForce West Virginia’s Statewide Virtual Job Fairs,” said Scott Adkins, Acting Commissioner of WorkForce West Virginia. “Employers and job seekers are encouraged to seize this opportunity to connect and grow together. Since these Statewide Virtual Job Fairs began three years ago, the Virtual Job Fair has had 33,704 registered job seekers, 4,828 registered employers and 17,999 available job openings. In January 2026, the Virtual Job Fair had 1,077 registered job seekers, 106 registered employers, and 614 available job openings.”

Registration is required for both interested employers and job seekers. Register as a job seeker for the February 4 Statewide Virtual Job Fair. When attending the event, job seekers are encouraged to dress professionally and have a calm, clutter-free background. The Virtual Statewide Job Fair portal features a Job Seeker Training video, a list of participating employers and channels for attendees to register and log in. Severe blood shortage: Red Cross blood supply drops 35%

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (Hinton News) — The American Red Cross is facing a severe blood shortage as requests from hospitals exceed the available supply of blood, leading to about a 35% drawdown of blood products in the past month. Individuals are urged to give now so patients don’t face delays in lifesaving care. The shortage is especially serious for types O, A negative and B negative blood.

High flu activity in nearly every state may be sidelining donors, slowing efforts to rebuild the Red Cross national blood supply. At the same time, hospitals already feeling the strain of the worst flu season in nearly 20 years are now also forced to triage critical blood products. Without immediate action, patients who count on transfusions — including trauma victims, mothers in childbirth and people with sickle cell disease or cancer — face serious risk.

There’s no time to wait — book an appointment to give blood now by using the Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

As a thank-you to donors for helping tackle the blood shortage, those who come to give through Jan. 25, 2026, will be automatically entered for a chance to win a trip for two to Super Bowl LX in the San Francisco Bay Area. Weather disrupts vital donations

About 400 blood drives were impacted due to extreme winter weather last month alone — more than three times the number of blood drives impacted during the same time the previous year. As a result, thousands of blood donations have gone uncollected. With intense winter weather and freezing temperatures expected across much of the country in the coming weeks, more blood drives could potentially be delayed or canceled at a time when every unit of blood could be the difference for doctors facing difficult choices about which patients receive blood transfusions and who will need to wait.

“Winter always puts pressure on the blood supply, and this year widespread flu and rough weather are making it even tougher,” said Paul Sullivan, senior vice president of Red Cross donor services. “If you’re able, now’s a great time to make and keep blood donation appointments, during National Blood Donor Month. Every donation can be a lifeline for a patient who isn’t able to hold off on critical care.”

A PROCLAMATION
By the Governor

WHEREAS, the passing of Justice Tim Armstead, has caused a vacancy in the office of Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia; and

WHEREAS, article VIII, section 7 of the Constitution of West Virginia provides that if from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the office of a justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals, the Governor shall issue a directive of election to fill such vacancy in the manner prescribed by law for electing a justice of the court in which the vacancy exists, and the justice shall be elected for the unexpired term; and

WHEREAS, section 3, article 10, section 3 of the West Virginia Code provides that where an unexpired term of office for a justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals is for a period longer than two years, the vacancy shall be filled by a successor who has timely filed a certificate of candidacy, and has been elected in a non-partisan election and qualified to fill the unexpired term; and

CHARLESTON W.Va. (Hinton News) —Medicare scams topped the list of fraud complaints reported to the West Virginia Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division in 2025, according to the office's year-end review.

From January 1, 2025, through December 31, 2025, the top 10 fraud complaints reported to the Consumer Division were:

- Medicare,
- Robo Calls,
- Social Security/Government,
- Loans,
- Sweepstakes/Lottery/Prize,
- Debt Collection,
- Service Disconnection/Promotion,
- Computer/Phishing/Social Media,
- Tax Relief/Forgiveness,
- Home Warranty/Home Protection.

The division saw a notable uptick in debt collection, tax relief, and home warranty scams in December as fraudsters targeted consumers during the holiday season.

Dear Recycle Lady

Dear Recycle Lady,
I know #1 clamshell containers are not recyclable here, but what about the clear, solid (no holes or perforations) tops to take out and other food containers that are #1? And what about the large, deep, clear #1 containers that fresh spinach comes in? Does the recycling center only want bottles? Recycler

Dear Recycler,
Plastic food containers, regardless of the recycling symbol, are not recyclable. These containers are made of a low-melt #1 PET, so they are not as durable as bottle-grade #1 PET. Plus, most of these containers are mixed with additives to make them moisture-resistant. Additionally, plastic food containers often contain food residue and are thus contaminated, which is the number one reason that plastic food containers are not recyclable. Greasy takeout containers and containers with glossy stickers or ink-printed designs are also contaminants, a serious problem for recyclers. One unrinsed plastic container that has food residue left in it can contaminate an entire load of recyclables. According to <https://blistera.com/why-are-clamshell-containers-not-recyclable/>, regulatory pressure is mounting, and states like California are now requiring that all packaging, including clamshells, be recyclable or compostable by 2032. You are correct in saying that bottles and jugs are the only plastics that the Recycle Center accepts, as they are made with a higher grade of PET plastic.

Dear Recycle Lady,
What is the difference between global warming and climate change? Curious
Dear Curious,
Global warming and climate change are often used interchangeably, but they are not the same. In fact, global warming is one aspect of climate change. Other aspects of climate change, according to nasa.gov, are rising sea levels, shrinking

mountain glaciers, accelerating ice in Greenland, Antarctica and the Arctic, and shifts in flower/plant blooming times. Deserts are expanding, heat waves and wildfires are becoming more common, as is water scarcity, disease and economic loss. All of these factors are consequences of global warming. The Earth Science Division of NASA operates more than 20 satellites in orbit, looking for new ways to observe changes in oceans, land cover, ice, atmosphere, and life, and to study potential solutions.

Dear Recycle Lady,
Several packages that we have received in the mail lately have been in envelopes lined with thin plastic bubble wrap inside. Can these envelopes be recycled? Questioning Recycler

Dear Questioning Recycler,
Unfortunately, the envelopes with bubble wrap are difficult to recycle because the bubble wrap is glued inside the envelope and is very difficult to separate. Thus, these envelopes that are both paper and plastic are not recyclable, unless they have a recycle symbol on them. However, all of these envelopes can be reused for future mailings. It's good to know you are considering different kinds of items for recycling. Thanks for asking.

Interesting Information: Scientists have confirmed that by feeding and pooping, whales are heroes of

the ocean. Since whale poop is rich in nutrients like iron, it helps phytoplankton grow. These tiny ocean plants of phytoplankton absorb large amounts of carbon dioxide during photosynthesis, helping reduce the carbon dioxide (CO₂) that goes into the atmosphere. Phytoplankton is the basis of the food chain for all ocean life. The tiniest creatures like krill depend on it for their food, and they in turn are the food source for larger organisms such as fish, penguins and other sea birds, on and on up the food chain!

Greenbrier Valley Sportsman Alliance Surpasses \$100,000 in Donations to Local Youth

GREENBRIER VALLEY W.Va. (Hinton News) - What began in August 2023 with eight people and a desire to educate youngsters about the outdoors has grown into an organization with 73 members and donations that have now exceeded \$100,000 for local youth.

The Greenbrier Valley Sportsman Alliance (GVSA), whose mission is, in part, to foster a spirit of camaraderie among members of the community through a common interest in hunting, shooting, fishing and overall outdoors, recently awarded \$19,000 in grant money to various Archery in the Schools Programs and the JROTC Air Rifle Team. Through their support of local groups in Greenbrier, Pocahontas, Monroe and Summers counties, the organization has grown into one that will forever be instilled in the hearts and minds of young outdoorsmen (and women) as they grow.

“It’s a great privilege to work with the young people,” says Ralph Taylor, President of Greenbrier Valley Sportsman

Alliance. “The whole reason behind the club is to get these kids outdoors and away from the video games and phones. So far, it’s worked very well and we’ve had a lot of support. All of the money raised stays right here in the Greenbrier Valley and is spent here on the kids,” he adds. That’s the joy of it all.”

In addition to various youth events throughout the year, the GVSA also supports the Hattie Rae Callison Memorial Scholarship Fund, through which they have donated over \$6,000 to local area schools, including Greenbrier East and Greenbrier West. “I am honored to be part of Greenbrier Valley Sportsman Alliance, an organization that is committed to encouraging our youth to enjoy the outdoors,” says Ronnie Snedegar, member-at-large.

In order to continue, this organization relies not only on member support, community involvement and local youth’s interest in the outdoors, but also on the effort on the part of the grant/donation recipients. When money is donated to a specific program, the recipients are expected

to help raise part of their financial goal themselves to demonstrate their effort. For example, if \$3,000 is requested, the recipient might be asked to raise \$1,000 themselves and will then be gifted the remaining \$2,000. In addition, grant/donation recipients must support the GVSA by donating their time in helping with youth day, other events or at the banquet.

The Greenbrier Valley Sportsman Alliance will host their 3rd annual banquet on Saturday, March 7, in the WV Building at the West Virginia State Fairgrounds. With 800 tickets initially available, the event is nearing, or has possibly already reached, sellout. However, there are still opportunities for those who wish to contribute. The organization is currently seeking underwriters for several items, including 2 Earl Jackson wine barrel tables. These locally handcrafted items will be part of a silent auction at the banquet, with all proceeds benefiting local youth. Other items will be auctioned live.

“We have no paid positions,” Ronnie Snedegar said. “In

fact, every member pays \$50 a year to be part of GVSA. We buy our own shirts and hats to work the banquet,” he adds. “Zero dollars go anywhere except to help our kids.”

All funds raised at the Greenbrier Valley Sportsman Alliance annual banquet will benefit local youth and future GVSA events. If you are interested in underwriting an item for the banquet or would like to make a monetary donation, you can reach out to any member through social me-
