Summers County Woman Charged after Alleged Stabbing at Alderson-area Home

SUMMERS COUNTY- A Summers County woman is facing a felony charge after West Virginia State Police allege she stabbed a man during an incident at a residence in the Alderson area late on the evening of July 23.

According to the criminal complaint, troopers were called to Clayton Judson Road at approximately 10:45 p.m. after a neighbor reported that a man had arrived at his home seeking help, claiming he had been stabbed. Investigators said the victim identified Caroline Huffman as the person responsible. The man told officers he had returned home from work, unlocked the front door, greeted Huffman, and was allegedly stabbed before fleeing the residence on a dirt bike to a nearby home to seek assistance. He told investigators the two were friends but were not in a dating relationship.

Troopers later interviewed Huffman, who denied any involvement in the stabbing and told officers she had not seen the man since earlier that morning. During a search of the residence, investigators reported finding what appeared to be a bloodstain on a table near the front door, although the knife believed to have been used was not located. According to the complaint, Huffman was unable to explain the presence of the blood and told investigators the man had been "acting crazy" and behaving erratically.

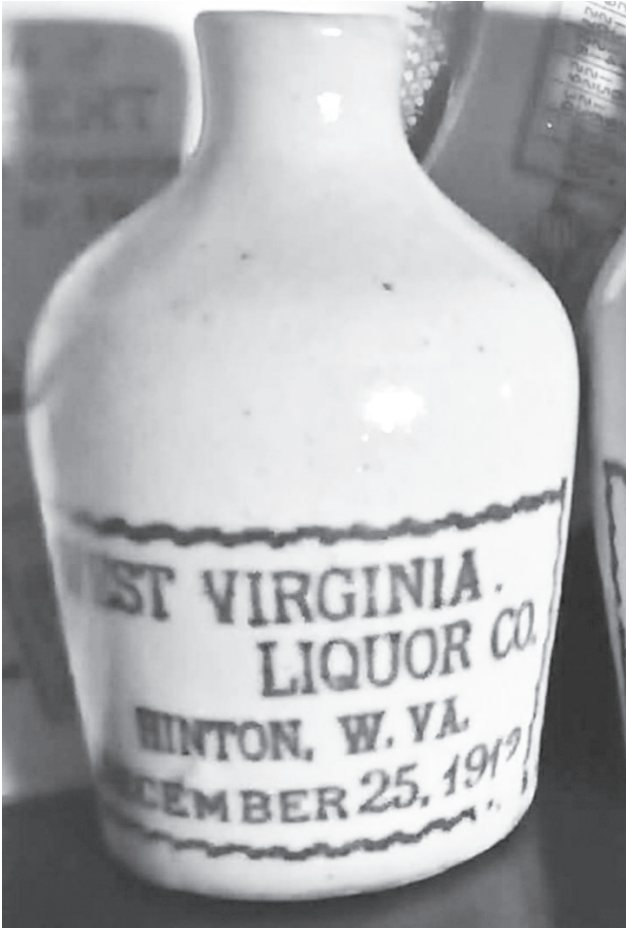
Based on statements gathered during the investigation and evidence collected at the scene, Huffman was arrested on a charge of unlawful assault/wounding and transported to the Southern Regional Jail, where she is being held pending court proceedings. State Police also noted in the complaint that Huffman had previously been arrested in connection with another stabbing case in Summers County. The allegations remain under investigation, and Huffman is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty in a court of law.

I had already purchased a few pieces from him, such as the bottle I wrote about last week. Then, I noticed in his listing of three of these miniature crock jugs that one appeared to be different. There also appeared to be a date across the bottom.

So, I zoomed in to see it better in his advertisement. I was correct, one was different from the one I already have which is in the first photo. After looking more closely, since the text color and size of the bottle are nearly identical. It is for the “West Virginia Liquor Co. Hinton, W. VA December 25, 1912”.

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**SUMMERS COUNTY SCHOOLS PROVIDE
MEALS TO STUDENTS AT NO COST**

For immediate release: August 5, 2026

Students in Summers County will have the opportunity to eat a No-Cost Breakfast And Lunch at School through the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) program.

The CEP was enacted as a result of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act and provides universal meal service to children in high-poverty areas. This is the fourth year for the option.

The CEP serves as an alternative to collecting, approving and verifying household eligibility applications for free- and reduced-price eligible students in high-poverty Local Education Agencies (LEAs). If at least 25 percent of a school's student population is directly certified for free meal benefits, the entire school qualifies for the option.

"I am proud that Summers County Schools will be participating in the CEP program to help meet a crucial need for many students in our county," said, Linda Knott, Superintendent of Summers County Schools. "We know academic achievement increases when our students are well-fed and ready to learn, and we must provide secure and reliable access to nutritious meals, so all students have a chance to achieve at the highest level possible."

Summers County expects to have all schools participate in the CEP. We have three elementary schools and our 6-12 comprehensive high school participates. The program allows the school system to feed nearly 1,050 students each day.

The 2017 *Feeding America: Map the Meal Gap* data reports high levels of food insecurity and hunger across the country. In West Virginia, more than 14 percent of residents, and over 79,000 children, live in food insecure households.

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Library Matters: A Home

Public buildings should be inspiring! Monumental! It is good for the collective soul to have awe inspiring court houses, schools and libraries. But should public libraries, which are often charged with being all things to all people, attempt to take on the responsibility of an historic old building which is often expensive to maintain and not suitable for modern use even if said building is inspirational and awesome? People expect libraries to provide books, information, meeting space, local history information, literacy classes, story times, book discussions – the list is long and varied, and resources are limited. So when in 1982 the “old” National Bank of Summers building became available, the Board of Directors of the Summers County Public Library hesitated, although they recognized that the Library had outgrown its rented space on the corner of third Ave and Temple St.

The National Bank of Summers building was elegant and inspiring with floors strong enough to hold the weight of tons of books, but the estimated cost to turn just its first two floors into a modern public library was in excess of \$100,000. In 1977 when the Library had first opened its doors, the

Board had established a building fund but by 1982 had managed to save only \$3,000.

And that is why in 1982 the Board of Library Directors of the Summers County Public Library decided not to purchase the former National Bank of Summers building even though the selling price was only \$5,000.

Instead the building was purchased by the City of Hinton, and the then Mayor announced plans to tear it down and put a fire station on that site. Most folks thought that was a terrible idea. There was a huge ruckus with folks packing City Council meetings to express their dismay – one of them who came was a man named Hume Nowlan.

Hume had long been a distinguished citizen of Hinton but by 1982 he was 85 years old, very deaf, mostly blind and crippled with arthritis. Still there was nothing wrong with his mind. He did not approve of the City’s plan and decided to do something about it. He went to the City Council meeting where the discussion about the bank building was going on and presented a check for the building for \$6,000. The City accepted his offer and he signed the deed over to the Library Board of Directors. He gave the building to the Library as a memori-

al to his wife, Pearl, who had been an educator in Summers County in 1930s and 40s.

That was December 1982. The Library Board now needed \$100,000 to turn that leaky old building into a library. What happened next was beyond surprising!

When the WV Legislature met that winter, the delegate from Weston tried to slip an appropriation into the State budget for \$800,000 to build a new library in his district. That amount was reduced to \$80,000 during the final budget negotiations in Charleston. Rockefeller, who was Governor at that time, noted that \$80,000 was insufficient to build a new library anywhere, but it would go a long way toward the renovation of the bank building in Hinton and directed that \$50,000 of it be sent to us!

That appropriation made the Library eligible for matching federal dollars. Renovations of the first two floors followed, and by February of 1984 the Library had moved into its new (and current) home.

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Finding Jesus, The Way

(Part 3)

Last week, we looked at Jesus in the Old Testament. Today we will look at Him in the gospel accounts.

FINDING JESUS IN THE GOSPELS

It is here that we find the most complete record of Jesus’ life and teachings while on earth. By God’s Divine Providence, we are blessed with four different gospels, each with its different emphasis...

- **Matthew** emphasizes the “teachings” of Jesus (especially in regards to the kingdom of heaven)
- **Mark** features the “miracles” of Jesus, showing His power
- **Luke** underscores the “humanity” of Jesus (without detracting from His divinity)
- **John** stresses the “divinity” of Jesus (without detracting from His humanity)

Though accenting different aspects of Jesus’ life and teachings, they all have the same basic purpose: **to create faith**. As expressed by John in his gospel:

And truly Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name. (John 20:30-31)

The gospels help us to see Jesus through **the eyes of fulfillment**, as they carefully document how He fulfilled Old Testament prophecy (this is especially true with Matthew).

They also reveal what Jesus actually taught; therefore, no one can know Jesus without reading these gospels carefully. When we do, we may often be surprised to find out how **different** the real Jesus is and what He actually taught, from the one imagined by many! For example, many feel that they are going to heaven when they die; but Jesus taught that most will not:

“Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it.” (Matthew 7:13-14)

Among those who will be surprised at the Day of Judgment will be many who thought they knew and served Jesus in their lifetime:

“Not everyone who says to Me, ‘Lord, Lord,’ shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, ‘Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?’ And then I will declare to them, ‘I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!’” (Matthew 7:21-23)

Contrary to the “simple believism” that many people think is what is involved in following Jesus, by reading the gospels we learn what the real Jesus had to say about following Him:

Then He said to them all, “If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me. For whoever desires to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will save it. For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and is himself destroyed or lost?” (Luke 9:23-25)

Next week we will examine the importance of taking Jesus seriously when He gives a charge.

DEAR
ABBY: My parents had three kids. The oldest is married with five kids. The second is married with two kids. The third is single, has mild autism and has trouble meeting people. Our parents don't seem too concerned about the youngest being perpetually single, but he is unable to live on his own due to credit card debt that he can't pay back. He doesn't want to live with anyone unless he finds a romantic partner. What happens if he ends up being single for life? Is there anything that anybody can do to help him before our parents die? -- **FACING THE FUTURE**

DEAR FACING THE FUTURE: Has this sibling considered declaring bankruptcy? Mild autism should not stop him from living on his own again once his financial situation improves. A financial adviser or credit counselor may be able to help him with that. The National Foundation for Credit Counseling (nfcc.org) is a good place to start.

Encourage your brother to join social groups that suit his hobbies and interests. If a club has in-person meetups in a quiet space, he may be able to attend comfortably without becoming overstimulated. He may not find romance, but he could make new friends, easing everyone's anxiety about his future.

Proposed Amendment to the WV Constitution to be on the November 3, 2026, General Election Ballot.
Title of Amendment: "Amendment 1: Citizenship Requirement to Vote in West Virginia Elections Amendment"
Summary of Purpose: "This amendment provides that in all elections held in West Virginia only citizens of the United States who are citizens of this state are qualified to vote."
Full Text of the Amendment: §4-1. Only citizens of the United States who are citizens of this state shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but a person who is a minor, or who has been declared mentally incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction, or who is under conviction of treason, felony or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the state and of the county in which he or she offers to vote, for 30 days next preceding such offer, shall not be permitted to vote while such disability continues; and, a person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall not be deemed a resident of this state by reason of being stationed therein.
